Adec will report as to the tests to which the official ball adopted for turnaments should be subjected. A. L. Hoskins, Philadelphia, will report on the adoption of official colors and a seal for the association. R. D. Little will offer plans for the institution of tournaments for school boys under national supervision. No action will be taken as to changing the national championship from Newport to other courts at this meeting.






