ARGENTINE BOON TO SHIPPERS

OMAHA, Jan. 5, 1915.

The news from abroad was mostly builish and more than 3,00,000 bushels of wheat were taken in all positions pesterday by expecters. Growers of wheat are not selling wheat in large quantities, even on the advance, but they are caustious about allowing any to slip through their fingers, and then only at prices quite satisfactory to them. It is expected that Argentina will soon commence to ship wheat liberally, but the unfavorable weather in that country as well as the shortage in tonnage, has almost entirely cut off movement.

Lively profit taking here by fortunate builts threatened for a while to offset the sreater part of the fresh gains, but on a second swell the market rebounded higher than before and wound up within \$\frac{1}{2}c\$ of the top level reached.
