Fontenelle Hotel Mortgage Ready to Be Recorded Soon

A \$400,000 mortgage, securing the loan made by the Metropolitan Life Insurance company to the Douglas Hotel company, to enable the latter to complete the Fontenelle hotel building, will be placed on record this week, possibly Wednesday or Thursday. It is a first mortgage on the hotel property at Eighteenth and Douglas streets, which cost over \$1,000,000. An \$800,000 tax stamp will be affixed to the document.

"If the building is completed and turned over by the contractors by February 15, the Fontenelle can open for business by March 1," said President William H. Burbank of the operating company before going east on business. Manager Vaughn of the Selden-Stock Construction company declares that his workmen can finish the big building a week earlier than required by the contract.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Douglas hotel company will be held at the city hall January 19. A board of fifteen directors is to be elected. All of last year's directors, except F. A. Nash, deceased, and Charles T. Kountze, resigned, will probably be re-elected. It is said. At that time the stockholders will be asked to ratify the action of the

directors in negotiating the big loan to complete the hotel.

Gurton W. Watters is now president of the holding company, and A. L. Reed is secretary.
