The worst of the unloading by wheat holders took place after the rumors crystallized into definite assertions that one of the Turkish forts had been demolished and others badly damaged. Under the consequent crumbling of values here, \$14c a bushel vanished as compared with the record last week at the highest price realised since the beginning of the war.

BERLIN, Jan. 11 - thy Wireless to London.)-Recounting the progress of the war, the daily official statement issued by the German army headquarters announces today that in an engagement near Perthes on the center of the battle line in France, the Germans have recaptured the parts of some trenches which had been stormed by the French and that the Germans inflicted heavy leases on their opponents. Fresh German successes are claimed in

the Argonne region and the statement also reports that French attacks at La Boisselle and at a point north of Soisson were repulsed. Unfavorable weather continues to hin-

der the military operations in Russian Poland, though the Germans claim to be making progress slowly in the direction : Warnaw. The text of the communication follows: "In the western theater at Nicuport and

Ypres and south thereof only artillery combats have taken place. A French attack at La Boisseele to the northeast of Albert, failed completely, "North of Soissons the French, who had established themselves in a small section of our outer trenches, attacked

afresh, but so far they have gained no aucceases. The battles continue. "In the neighborhood of Soupir (east of Vailly) no fighting has taken place during the last few days.

"To the east of Perthes our troops have recaptured that portion of our trenches which the enemy had taken. In this engagement heavy losses were inflicted on

the French. "In the Argonne forest our attacks have made further progress.

"In Upper Aleace the situation is tran-"In the eastern war arena in East Prussia and in northern Poland the situation remans the same.

"On account of unfavorable weather our attacks in Poland, to the west of the Vistula river, are making slow progress."

But all who had the good fortune to have his sole company on beard the imperator of Vateriand over Ban Francisco. But all who had the good fortune to have his sole company on board the Imperator of Vaterland over a glass of wine will never forget the yarns and tales of this man. Most attractive and pathetic was his childlike and buoyant spirit, which as I was afraid from the beginning, became fatal to him in the end. But he had to reckon with the probability of being ultimately discovered on his dangerous post, and so he ended his patriotic commission whereby he did more for the fatherland than 1,000 soldiers in the field have done.

When I crossed the court of the Tower of London with him he made such humorous remarks about the English salders who were drilling there, with their towering burbles and chin straps. And now on the very same spot he flad to direct his last glance to the gun barreis of these soldiers.

Whoever made a journey with Hans Lody into the wide and lovely world will not have forgotien this fine man. Thousands remember him with me today sorsowfully, but proudly.
