WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.-Release on onds of ships detained in British prize been purchased by the American conourts will be permitted by the British evernment if the judge court is willing cording to a statement issued today by the British embassy.

The embansy statement says.

While it cannot give a pledge that all ships now in prize courts will be released on bail being offered, because the decision must rest with the judge, his majesty's government, in order to re lieve a shortage of tonnage, is anxious to withdraw ships as little as possible from the carrying trade, and will thereis provided for. Bonds may be issued fore not oppose release on bail of ships now in prize courts, if ball is offered. "Only seven neutral vessels are at present in prize court and five ships are detained in the United Kingdom to addition at this moment, for examination as to character and to destination of cargo. 
