Fighting at El Kantara CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 5 .- (Via London.) An engagement occurred yesterday to the eastward of Elkantara in Egypt, presumably with the advance guard of Turkish army, although details are lacking. The Egyptian losses were one officer and four men slightly wounded. Only a comparatively small number of men were engaged in the fighting, which was in the nature of skirmishes.

Detachments of Turkish troops have been sighted at three other points to the east of the Suez canal, but no fighting has resulted except that in the vicinity of El Kantara. In this engagement the Turks opened fire at long range with mountain guns. The British replied with machine guns and rifles.

A liritish sea plane dropped bombs upon the Turkish forces near Birmurhadad, inflicting losses.

Fighting in this locality indicates that not only has a Turkish invasion of Egypt been begun, as was reported in an earlie dispatch from Athens, but that Turkish forces have penetrated a considerable distance into Egypt. Et Kantara is twentyeight miles south of Port Said and is or the Suez canal, which, it is assumed, is the immediate objective of the Turkish advance.
