

A. C. Wakeley, representing the judiiary and building and site committees of the Board of Education, appeared before the city commissioners and stated that it is the sentiment of the two school board committees mentioned that it is not wise to make the school board or the school properties an integral part of the recreation scheme proposed under the new ordinance which mentions the superntendent of schools as one of the board

'Do we understand that the Board of Education refuses an invitation to cooperate in this recreational plan?" maked ommissioner J. B. Hummel.

The gist of Mr. Wakeley's reply was that the school board is operating under specific state laws, and as for recrea-tion in schools the board is now taking The spirit of Mr. Wakeley's talk was to carry on their own recreation activities in their own way without any out-side co-operation, such as is proposed by the new recreation board.

Board May Jelu In. City Attorney J. A. Rine explained that the ordinance leaves the matter open for the Board of Education to co-operate if the members so elect; that the proposed recreation board would not interfere with any school property without full sanction of the school board.

Dr. Cyrus Stimpson of the Playground and Recreation Association of America also explained to Mr. Wakeley that the ordinance in no way imposes any obligations upon the Board of Education, but rather makes it possible for the school efficials to co-operate in the recreational campaign it is believed will be carried

. The commissioners recommended that the ordinance be passed in its present form at the regular meeting of the city
