

HOWELL LETS MAN GO ON WIFE'S BOND

United States Attorney Sympathizes and Gives Morris Lanigan Freedom on Own Word.

CHARGED WITH BOXCAR THEFT

Morris Lanigan's fearful protestations of innocence touched the heart of United States Attorney Howell.

Morris was arrested in South Omaha on a charge of breaking into box cars and stealing goods being conveyed in interstate commerce.

They were in the United States attorney's office.

"Now, see here," said Mr. Howell, sinking a finger in Morris' hair, "I let you go on your own bond."

Morris declared that ten years in the penitentiary wouldn't keep him from appearing.

"Well," said Mr. Howell, "I'm going to let you out just on your promise. It's just between you and me, and I don't believe you'll disappoint me. It was somewhat the government's fault for not having witnesses here."

A bond was signed by Morris' wife. "Judge, I thank you from the bottom of my heart, and I won't never throw you down," Morris declared to Mr. Howell.

Motion in Matters Case Up Monday

Two divisions of the federal court will be in operation in Omaha next Monday. Judge Thomas C. Minger will be here from Lincoln to hear bankruptcy and equity cases and Judge Frank A. Youmans will come from Fort Smith, Ark., to hear arguments on two motions in the Thomas H. Matters case.

Matters was found guilty on nineteen out of twenty counts charging him with aiding President Luebken of the defunct First National bank of Sutton to issue certificates of deposit without authority. The motions to be heard are for a new trial and for arrest of judgment.

Judge Elliott, who has been hearing the damage suit of John A. Moore against the Union Pacific railway, will return to Sioux Falls, S. D.

Rate Increase from Omaha Postponed

The proposed increase in freight rates on furniture to Omaha from Chicago and points west, is not to go into effect April 3, as planned by the railroads. The Interstate Commerce commission has decided to hold up the advanced schedule until June 29. This was done when the commission received a vigorous protest against the advance from the Associated Retailers of Omaha. Secretary J. W. Metcalfe of the Associated Retailers received a letter this morning from Secretary McGinty of the Commerce commission, conveying this information.

Wheat Drops to Law Price of the Year

A cable report that 11,000,000 bushels of Siberian wheat is in storage at Vladivostok, ready to be shipped to the war zone of Europe as soon as an opening is made through the Dardanelles, drove wheat down three to four cents per bushel and the Omaha market quickly followed the lead, prices here dropping to \$1.45 per bushel, the lowest of the year.

Corn was off 1/4 of a cent, selling at 64¢ 1/2 cents per bushel.

Corn receipts were thirty-two cars, and oats, twenty-five cars.

The former was given a suspended sentence and the latter was fined \$5 and costs. McMillan was also fined \$5 and costs when he swore in court.
