Teuton Allies Are Continuing Pursuit Of Fleeing Russians

VIENNA, May 17.—(Via London.)—The following statement was issued today at the army headquarters: "In Russian Poland the allied forces continue their pursuit of the Russians. The district south of the Lower Pilica has been cleared of the enemy. "In the mountain region from Kleic to the Upper Kamienka we advanced along the Vistula to the heights north of Kilmombon. "In the region of Rudnik and Przemyl (Galicia), Russian rear guards were repelled from the west of the river bank, losing many prisoners. "Our armies continue to advance from the wooded Carpathians. A strong Russian rear guard was dispersed yesterday in the region of Magiera Height. We took seven guns and eleven machine guns and captured more than 1,000 prisoners. "In the forenoon our troops entered Sambor, enthusiastically cheered by the populace. "In southwestern Galicia fresh Russian attacks were repulsed. North of Kolomena we captured a Russian point of support. "Farther down the Pruth to the frontier, quiet prevailed."

Invading Army is Marching on U. S. From Idle Canada

EMERSON, Manitoba, May 17.—Two hundred Austrians and Russians, the vanguard of an army of unemployed estimated at 1,000, arrived here tonight in their search for work, which they believe will be given them across the border in the United States. The little army was much weakened by exposure, many of its number having been without food since leaving Winnipeg three days ago. Leaders of the band declare they will present themselves to the United States immigration officials tomorrow for entry, both the Canadian and United States officials say they will oppose any attempt by the unemployed to cross the line, and trouble is feared. Owing to a lack of employment in Canada, it is stated by leaders of the men that between 150 and 1,000 more of their countrymen will cross for the United States within a few days.

SOLDIERS OF ITALY AND AUSTRIA FIGHT

Rome Reported to Have 1,700,000 Men Mobilized and Equipped for War. SALANDRA CABINET WILL STAY

GENEVA (Via Paris), May 17.—A telegram from Lugano, a Swiss city near the Italian border, says that Italy now has 1,700,000 soldiers mobilized and equipped. It also is said that the Austrian government has confiscated the property of the Rothschilds, as well as that of various English, French and Russian families. Fighting between Austrian and Italian soldiers on the frontier is reported.

Goeben Is Reported Again Damaged by The Russian Fleet

PETROGRAD (Via London), May 17.—The following statement was issued today at the war office: "The Goeben, which fired 200 shells at the Russian fleet while it was bombarding the Bosphorus, without scoring a single hit, was itself obliged to return to the Golden Horn, with a hole in its hull, stopped up with collision mats. "A portion of its main deck was torn away and a funnel was damaged. Many of its crew were killed or wounded. "The warship referred to in the foregoing is the Turkish cruiser Sultan Selim, formerly the German cruiser Goeben. It was turned over to the Turks by the German cruiser Bismarck, last fall. The Sultan Selim has been engaged in several battles with the Russian fleet and on half a dozen occasions were reported to have been damaged by shells or mines.
