### Horse Racing is Resumed at Berlin

BERLIN, May 26 .- (Via London.)-Horse racing was resumed in Germany teday with the opening of the spring meeting at Hoppegarten track, in a suburb of Berlin, in the presence of a crowd aimost as large as is usually present in peace times. The Paris mutual system of betting has been temporarily abandoned, but bookmakers are allowed to accept wagers, although the odds are not published.

There are large fields for all races, with twenty-aix starters in the principal event. Subjects of nations at war with Germany are barred from the grounds, This rule applies to trainers and jockeys as well as to spectators, and was adopted as a measure of precaution to prevent race track followers, many of whom were engaged on the German turf before the war began.

It had been feared the controversy over the shipment of munitions of war from the United States to nations hostile to Germany might result in some exhibition of feeling against American trainers and lockeys, but two victories to the credit of Jockey Archibald seemed the most popular of the day.
