Thiele, broker in the employ of the General Film company, who alleges that his 20-year-old bride, Mrs. Ruth Gray Thiele, for merely his stenographer, whom he married February 18, has revealed to him that she does not love him, has filed suit for divorce in district court on grounds of cruelty. The petition alleges that his pretty young wife has told him that her love has been given to another man. Is a bride's statement to her husband that she does not love him cruelty of such nature as to constitute cause for divorce is a question which must be decided by the district court in the suit. Mrs. Thiele has left her husband and is living at 1929 Douglas street. She is using her maiden name, Miss Ruth Gray. "I will not deny Mr. Thiele's charges and will not contest the suit," she said.
