TO INVESTIGATE JURY BRIBE CHARGE

Alleged Misconduct is Set Up in Case Tried in Sarpy County.

EISFELDER DENIES CHARGE

Charges of alleged jury bribery and misconduct on the part of the jury which returned a verdict for the defense in Mrs. Charles Johnson's \$40,000 damage suit against nine Omaha saloon keepers and the Illinois Surety company, tried at Papillion, Sarpy county, last September, were made to District Judge Begley Thursday and resulted in an order by him that an investigation be made next Thursday in his court at

An affidavit filed by A. E. Langdon an attorney for Mrs. Johnson, recited that Henry Efsielder, former police offirer of South Omaha, had told him that Einfelder had received about \$20 from the defendants, and that one defendant had said he would give Einfelder a suit of ciothes. The affidavit set forth that Elsfelder had said he had heard that another member of the jury had received

Elsfelder new denies that he had made the statements reported in Langdon's affidavit, according to L J. Dunn of counsel representing the saloon keepers, and denied that he had received any money or had heard of any other juror

alleging that as a result of their sale of liquor to her husband, she had been damaged in the amount of \$40,000. The suit was brought in Sarpy county on the theory that the jurors there would be more kindly disposed to the plaintiff in such litigation than in Douglas county. Affidavits formerly filed in the case alered that the Sarpy county jurers discommend in the jury room the fact that the bringing of the suit there would result in Sarpy county rather than Douglass county bearing the burden of ex-
