Another Suit Filed to Stop the Merger

An injunction suit to prevent the consummation of annexation as provided in the proclamation of Governor Morehead has just been filed in district court by Lewis B. Reed, Mary Ann Whyte and James Trebilcock of Dundee.

City officials of Omaha and the Dundee village board are made defendants. The court is asked to forbid the Omaha men from taking jurisdiction over Dundee and to restrain the Dundee officials from turning over the village records. The petition alleges that the annexation law is unconstitutional, the grounds for the assertion being similar to those advanced in a former suit in which District Judge Redick upheld the law.
