CHICAGO, June 18.—Black rust reports from Missouri and Kansas added today to the builish temper which his storms in the west had given to the wheat market losed firm at 1½c to 1½c net advance. In corn the outcome varied from ½c off to ½c outcome varied from ½c off to ½c up, cats finished with a gain of ½c to ½c½c, and provisions ranging from 2½c decline to a rise of 19c.

Notwithstanding that active selling in which foreigners were said to have taken a hand made the wheat market recede from an early advance, the increasing number of crop damage reports coupled with black rust talk led afterwards to a decided fresh upturn in values. Before the day was over, the fact seemed evident that a great deal of wheat in Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri and other important parts of the soft winter belt had ben laid flat, and that the harvest delay in Kansas and Oklahoma was increased to a serious extent. Meanwhile, predictions of another storm from over the Rockles by Saturday night emphasized the danger of rust.

Buils in wheat were encouraged by goesip that efforts to overcome difficulties in regard to foreign exchange were likely soon to help revive export demand. Ocean freight rates appeared to be easing off, and advices from Liverpool said the liberal shipments promised by India had turned out disappointingly small.

Cheap Argentine offers at New York finally proved more than an offset to fears that the domestic corn crop in the big surplus producing states had been handicapped by too much cold and rain. In the final hour, many early huyers unloaded, and there was aggressive selling on the part of speculative shorts. Oats ruled a little firmer than corn owing to reports of a good deal of lodging, the consequence of excessively wet windy weather.
