Mayor Dahlman and the mayor of Council Bluffs will drive the big gold spike, following a parade of scores of autos through the business section of Omaha.

Sheriff F. J. McShane, Jr., director of contests for the Speedway, has returned from Chicago, where he signed some of the world's best racing drivers for the July 5 classic here.
