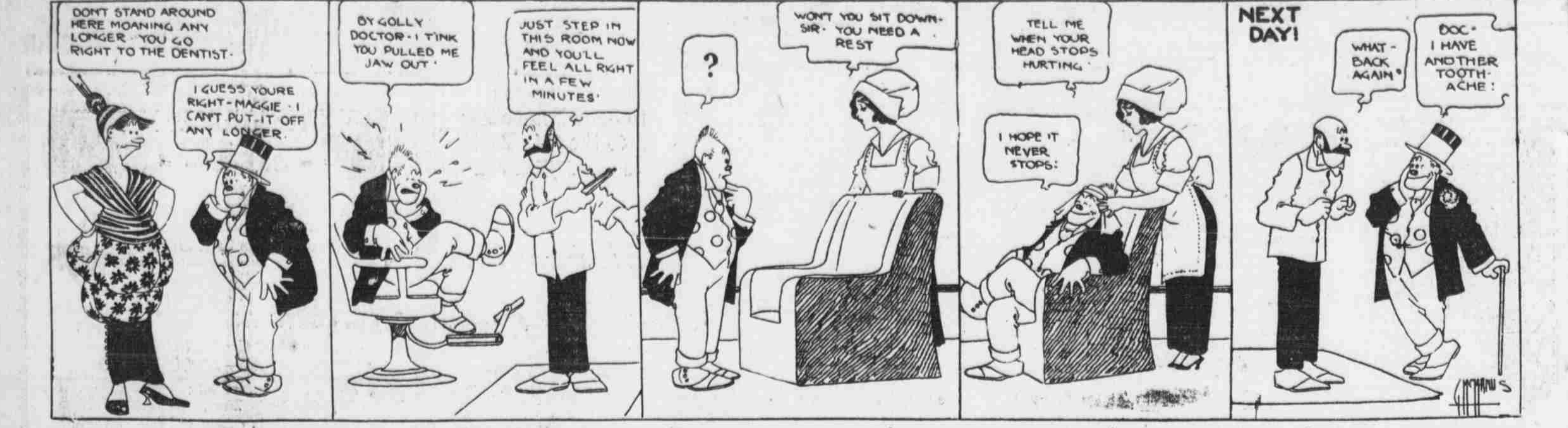

This Will Be Suggestion of Tip O'Neill to Western League Cities.

WILL SWING AROUND LOOP

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., June 25.—(Special Telegram)—Tip O'Neill, president of the Western league, will make a trip around the circuit beginning early next week and will suggest to commercial organizations that a booster day be held for the base ball clubs.

One of these booster days for each city is planned, one for eastern clubs and one for western clubs. The event will be held on the same day in each division on the circuit.

This much was decided upon this morning at the beginning of the season of Western league magnates here. An optimistic note was sounded after the meeting, O'Neill and every one of the magnates expressing confidence in the public.

"Conditions in the Western League are going to be great," said O'Neill, following the morning session. "We have had some awful weather and suffered greatly. We now have fifty-six postponed games. However, we're not going to howl. We're going through with every one of our agreements without a hitch. The public hasn't quit us now that the weather has commenced to favor us. We believe attendance in every city will be good."

The umpire question was not taken up at the morning session, but it was expected to be this afternoon.
