

PARIS, June 26.-The Germans, fighting furlously at Bagatelle and in the trenches of Calonno are seeking to approach the strongly fortified town of Verdun, according to Lieutenant Colonel Rousset, military critic of the Petit Parisien. He belives they are seeking control of the railroad from Chalons to Sainte Menchould. While they are aiming at Verdun from two ! directions the critic believes the efforts of their army will prove futile.

### Germans Force Way Across the Dniester

BERLIN, June 28 .- (Via London.) -- German troops, after fierce fighting have crossed the Dniester river between Bukaszowice and Chodorow in Galicia. and have taken by storm the hills on the northern bank, according to an official statement issued today by the German army headquarters staff.

"In France," the statement says, "French artillery stationed near the cathedral of Arras was bombarded by German batteries. In the Argonnes, a portion of a French trench was stormed by the Germans.'
