LAD WRITES AFTER HER DEATH

"Dear Mother: I want you to forgive me for not writing to you. I am going to come home and surprise you some day," wrote Andrea Albanese of Company A, Second infantry, U. S. A., Honolulu, to his mother at 1909 Dorcas street.

The mother died three years ago of a broken heart on account of the unexplained absence of her oldest child, whose letter recently was received at the motherless home.

Andrea Albanese left Omaha in 1909 with several other boys to "see the world." The other boys returned to their home town after satiating themselves with the great, wide world, but Andrea did not return. He changed his name and enlisted in army. He was 16 or 17 when he enlisted. After many days and nights of waiting for her son to return. Mrs. Albanese dies. It is said, she scanned the newspapers for several years, thinking perhaps she might read the name of her boy in some connection. No word ever came to the grief-stricken mother. The recent letter intended for her arrived too

A letter just received from the captain of Andrea's company states the young man now wishes to change his name to what it should be. The captain added that Andrea has a good army record and is now in Honolulu. Records are now being sent to meet the requirements of the army in such a case.

Andrea Albanese was born in Omaha and was baptised on June 4, 1898. He is the oldest of six children. His father has worked for the Union Pacific many years and owns the little home where he re-
