SPAIN STRENGTHENING ARMY Alfonse Preparing to Defend Do-

main After Present War Ends, if Necessary.

BUYING MINES AND MUNITIONS

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) MADRID, June 22.-The Spanish gov ernment recently has been active in the reparation of military and naval armaint. Artillery, small arms and projectile factories are working night and day, and the minister of war, desirous himself of learning their capacity, has during the last several days visited those at Trabia, Ovideo, Granada and Seville.

Military and naval commissions have left for the United States and Italy for the purpose of acquiring arms and ammunition, as well as the machinery for their manufacture. There is talk also of the acquisition by Spain of a number of submarines and of large quantities of mines for coast defense purposes.

All the activities are being conducted with the greatest secrecy, the government having requested the press to maintain rigid ellence on the subject. It is said that the motive behind these warlike preparations is by no means to enter the present European conflict on either side, but to strengthen Spain and to prepare it for any event which may follow the present war.

The idea seems to be that Spain should be able to defend its own territory and particularly the Balearic telands and the Canary islands, should Spanish possessions enter into the calculations of the makers of the final terms of peace.

Besides this motive, the Spanish government, prominent Spanlards say, fully realizes that it has been negligent in military and naval matters and, in view of the complete unexpectedness of some of the events which have characterized the present conflict, now finds it the part of wisdom to be prepared against any event.

Suggestions that these preparations on the part of Spain may be indicative of designs against Portugal or Gibraltar, are indignantly denied here.

Negro Accused of Many Crimes is Hanged to Bridge

SHAWNER, Okl., Aug. &-Ed Berry, negro, charged with two cases of criminal assaults and suspected in connection with ten others that have occurred here in the last three years, was taken from officers early today and hanged to a telephone pole at the scone of one of his alleged crime

Berry was brought here from the penitentiary at McAlester for trial. When the train arrived and the deputy sheriff and his prisoner alighted, they were covered by guns in the hands of a dozen who appeared suddenly from the darkness. After an attempt at gunplay, the officer was disarmed. Ten or twelve es loaded with masked men then appeared and the negro was quickly conveyed to the Beard street bridge. When the rope was adjusted around Berry's neck he was questioned about the crimes and asked if he was guilty. In such instance he nodded his head affirmatively. In every case the negro's victim was a white woman.
