He is believed to have held more important political offices than any other negro. He has held all the highest offices in the United Brothers of Friendship.

Captain Tandy was born a free negro his father, John Tandy, having purchased his freedom for \$1,000, which he had accumulated by extra work done mostlyat night. He was born in Lexington. Ky., December 16, 1838.

Captain Tandy secured an education for nimself by his own labor. In conversation he refers proudly to the fact that he is respected for his high character by white men and negroes in many states who are acquainted with him.


