Heavy Rain Visits Most of the State

While the weather is now clear, calm and warm over all Nebraska, according to the reports to the railroads, the eastern, central and southern portions of the state were swept by an unusually heavy downpour of rain last night.

Though the railroads sustained no damage by reason of washouts, all trains from out in the state were late on account of soft track. Along the Northwestern practically all the way from Omaha to Long Pine the precipitation was from one-half to an inch, and out around Lincoln from one to two inches. On the lines from Fremont to Hastings and Superior there was from two to six inches, the greatest precipitation being at Bee and Linwood.






