RED SOX AND PHILS WILL NOT GO WEST

Trip to Coast, with Stop at Omaha and Other Places, Ifs Called Off.

MONEY CAUSES THE HITCH

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 14.—The proposed trip to the Pacific coast of the world's champion Red Sox and the Philadelphia National League pennant winners was declared off today by Robert B. McRoy, representing the National Base Ball commission.

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Two Players Object. Today at a meeting of the Philadelphia players, at which they were given their share of the world series money, all consented to join the party with the exception of Pitcher Chambers and Outfielder Whitted, who had other plans.

Players Get Shares. The Philadelphia players' share of the world's series money was divided into twenty-four parts and each of the twenty-three men eligible to participate in the series was given a check for \$2,422.71.

BURNS SAYS ALL IS RIGHT

Young Man Selling House Numbers on South Side Has Consent of the City.

The searchlight turned by The Bee on the operations of the young man, named H. S. Burns, serving householders in South Omaha with official notices, signed by City Engineer Bruce, advising them of the change in street numbers in order to sell them metal number plates at so much per plate, has called forth a protest from the gentlemen. Mr. Burns, who is a bright young man, insists he is entirely innocent of any bad faith in using the blanks to promote his private business, although conceding that his customers might have gained the impression that he was working for the city, and finally admitting the questionable propriety of the procedure.

GIVES HIS SIDE OF THE CASE

The city engineering department has made elaborate blue prints showing the numbers of houses in South Omaha that have been changed, and would have to tell each householder what his number is. With Commissioner Jardine's consent, I have been doing this without cost to the city, getting my pay by selling these house numbers. I am selling two styles of metal numbers, which I buy at retail downtown here. It takes four to a set, and one style costs me 20 cents, and the other 30 cents, and I charge 50 cents for taking down the old numbers and putting up the new ones. I have not made more than ordinary wages out of the work.
