CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—Brisk European demand coincident with predictions that a severe cold wave would sweep over the domestic winter crop belt forced the wheat market today to the highest prices yet this season. The close was strong at 2%-62c to 2%c, net advances, with May \$1.23% Corn gained \$3%-3c to 2%c, net advances, with May \$1.23% Corn gained \$4%-3c to 1c and oats \$40%-c. In provisions the outcome varied from unchanged figures to a rise of 52%c.

Except for a brief setback soon after the opening, wheat showed unvarying strength. Buyers found their first incentive in higher quotations at Liverpool, where there was said to be an urgent call for supplies, especially on the part of miliers. Cable dispatches from Great Britain explained that contrary to expectations the clearances from Argentina and Australia remained light. Meanwhile advices from Minnespolis said that for the first time in six months the government of Holland was negotiating for American flour and that bids were also being received from the Italian government and from London. According to the latest estimates the export sales of wheat today, wholly aside from flour, amounted to fully 1,000,000 bushels.

Reports were received that snow protection in much of the domestic winter wheat region had melted away, and that water standing in the fields threatened serious damage in case of unusually low temperatures.

Corn responded to the wheat strength. Country offerings were smaller and eastern demand was slow.

Oats showed independent firmness. The reason was demand at the seaboard.

Provisions, although at first weak, rallied because of the upturn in the grain market. A feature was said to be the excellent call from Canada.



By noon a good clearance had been made, only a few loads of common mixed lights being left at that time.

General market was steady to se higher than yeaterday's average. Bulk of the sales landed at \$5,0077.16, with a good showing of the snod hogs as high as \$7.15, the day's top. Despite the fact that this week's receipts have been of the record variety, values show a net advance of a big nickel over last Saturday.

SHEEP-Sheep and lamb supplies broadened out somewhat today, about thirty-six cars, or 8,500 head, being reported in. Requirements are so extensive that productive and transportation facilities continue inadequate to meet current demands. Congestion of freight still prevails at the seaboard and, though railroads have made additions to rolling stock, domestic deliveries are increasingly difficult. This condition tends to further enhance the cost of commodities, while industrial expansion is checked at several points through inability to obtain raw materials.

Except in isolated cases there is no evidence that high prices are as yet lessening consumption, and it is significant that the prevailing disposition is still to contract ahead. Many traveling salesmen are sending in larger orders than usual and in some sections, notably in the southwest, forward business is developing with exceptional rapidity.

All signs point to a very active spring trade. Larger expenditures by the people are reflected in steadily improving mercantile collectious and the number of failures diminishes, the commercial mortality being much lighter than a year ago. Without exception important statistical records make highly gratifying comparison with those of earlier periods.
