CHARLEY WHITE TO REFEREE THE FIGHT

New York Man Selected to Give Decision in Bout Between Willard and Moran.

WAS THE ALTERNATE AT RENO

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Charley White of this city was today selected to referee the ten-round bout between Jess Willard and Frank Moran on March 3. The choice was made by the toss of a coin, after the managers of the two heavyweights had eliminated the names of all proposed referees except White and Jack Shelly. White was alternate referee for Tex Rickard, the promoter of the coming contest, at Reno, Nev., when Johnson won the heavyweight title from Jeffries, July 4, 1910.

May Play Some of Clay Doubles Here

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—The awarding of the national championship tournaments, the amendment of the constitution to admit the players of the public parks in large cities to membership and an expression as to the interpretation of the amateur rule will be the leading business of the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the United States National Lawn Tennis association, which will begin its session in this city tomorrow. It is practically settled that the all-comers' national championship singles, the challenge match in doubles and the intercollegiate tournament will again be staged at the West Side Tennis club, Forest Hills, L. I. The clay court championship may go either to Philadelphia, Pittsburgh or St. Louis. Additional sectional doubles championships may be scheduled for St. Louis, Pittsburgh or Omaha.

Games have also been scheduled with York and Aurora, but the dates have not yet been fixed.

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FISHERMEN OF THE BLUFFS TAKE STAND

Propose to Have Portion of License Money that Improvements May Be Made at Manawa.

SOME PLANS ARE OUTLINED

At the annual meeting of the Fish and Game club of Council Bluffs Tuesday night, plans that contemplate some method of forcing the state to return at least a part of the nearly \$4,000 annually collected in the bluffs and hoarded up at Des Moines as expended at Lake Okoboji, were discussed. Charles Pachet created a lot of enthusiasm when he pointed out the injustice of this, and he asserted there would not be much difficulty in creating a sentiment in the Iowa legislature that would bring about legal changes requiring at least half of this license money to be returned for use in permanent improvement of the lake. He asserted that the state has a big dredge that has been idle all the time it is not being worked in the Okoboji improvements. His information was that there is now being hoarded up at Des Moines about \$300,000 of the hunters' license money, and he believed this could be used as a strong argument to get license from the state some of the money that is being taken from Council Bluffs and use it for improvement of the lake. He suggested the bringing of the state dredge here and excavating the mud from the bottom of the lake, using it to construct a boulevard around the west and north sides that would form a permanent dike and an automobile driveway.

MARATHON RUNNER COMES TO OMAHA TO MAKE HOME

R. C. Caldero, a marathon runner with a reputation abroad, has come to Omaha to make his residence. Caldero comes to this city from Dallas, Tex. On New Year's day Caldero made a little excursion from Dallas to Fort Worth and romped home in second place in a five-mile cross-country race at that city. Caldero will show Omaha his speed at the approaching indoor athletic meet which the Young Men's Christian association will stage at the Auditorium March 31.

Dead or Alive, Finn On Tigers' Pay Roll

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Three St. Paul boxers won their matches in the same ring in Brooklyn tonight. Johnny Ertle, champion of the bantamweight title, outfought and outboxed Teddy Martin, of Providence, R. I. Ertle, weighing 115, had the better of nine of the ten rounds. Martin's weight was 115.4. Mike Ertle, brother of Johnny, weighing 108, defeated 'Kid' Murtha of Brooklyn, to whom he conceded seven pounds. Billy Defoe made his New York debut, winning from Hugh Rodden of Brooklyn. Defoe weighed 123 and Rodden 124.

Taft Says Filipinos Play Ball Instead of 'Head Hunting'

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Former President William H. Taft, addressing magistrates of the National league, declared base ball has been an important factor in civilizing the Philippines. He said American soldiers and sailors have taught the game to the natives, and that its influence has spread to the wilds of the island possessions. Base ball, he added, has been substituted for head hunting by the Igorrote tribes. Mr. Taft said he was glad the umpire has the authority to send off the field those players who do not behave themselves.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Feb. 10.—Their motor car lashed to a sledge on which it will be conveyed over the snow-laden mountains, Frank A. Thacker, superintendent of the Pima Indian reservation, and United States Marshal Joe Dillon left here today for Tuba, where Indians of the Navajo tribe are threatening an outbreak as the result of the killing of a brave by white policemen. The sledge will convey the party eighteen miles over the snow-covered trails. The officers hope they can make the remaining seventy miles to Tuba by the automobile.

REDFIELD ADMITS FIGURES ALL WRONG

Secretary Confesses Wholesale Inaccuracies in Government Export Statistics.

BUT HE 'PASSES THE BUCK'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Wholesale inaccuracies in government export statistics were admitted today by Secretary Redfield of the Department of Commerce, in a speech before the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. He said, however, that by an order issued February 1, he had remedied the situation so far as was in his power, and that errors of the past, caused by refusal of shippers to give the government facts and by antiquated laws, would not be repeated.

ADVENTIST SEES MORE WARS AND END OF WORLD AHEAD

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 10.—Following business sessions of the Central Union conference of the Seventh Day Adventists at which the question of greater missionary effort in the Orient was discussed, the meeting tonight was given over to a discussion of the European war. F. B. Thompson of Washington, D. C., preaching the principal sermon. He quoted public men as saying the last eighteen months have been the blackest in the history of the world.

PARIS HAS ITS FIRST SNOW OF THE SEASON

PARIS, Feb. 9.—The first snow of the season fell in Paris today. The snowfall was general throughout northern France and in all the trench country.

FLING FRENCH OUT OF WINTER CAVES

Germans Capture Eight Hundred Yards of Trenches on the Western Front.

MINE BLASTS DO THE WORK

The French and the Germans have been engaged in a furious combat on the sector of the western battle front between Lens and Arras, where recently there has been great activity. Berlin reports that to the west of the town of Vimy the Germans captured French positions over a length of 800 yards. Paris admits that the Germans, after the explosion of two heavily charged mines, got a foothold in portions of a French trench, but says they were driven out by hand grenade attacks.

Drive Germans Back

Paris also reports that the French in the grenade attack drove the Germans from a small post between Soissons and Rheims, and that the French batteries have badly damaged German organizations in the forest of Apremont, southeast of St. Mihiel. On the Russian front Berlin records the repulse of Russian infantry attacks at several points in the Riga region. A Petrograd dispatch says severe fighting is developing in this district, the preliminary artillery duels having changed into bombardments of great intensity.
