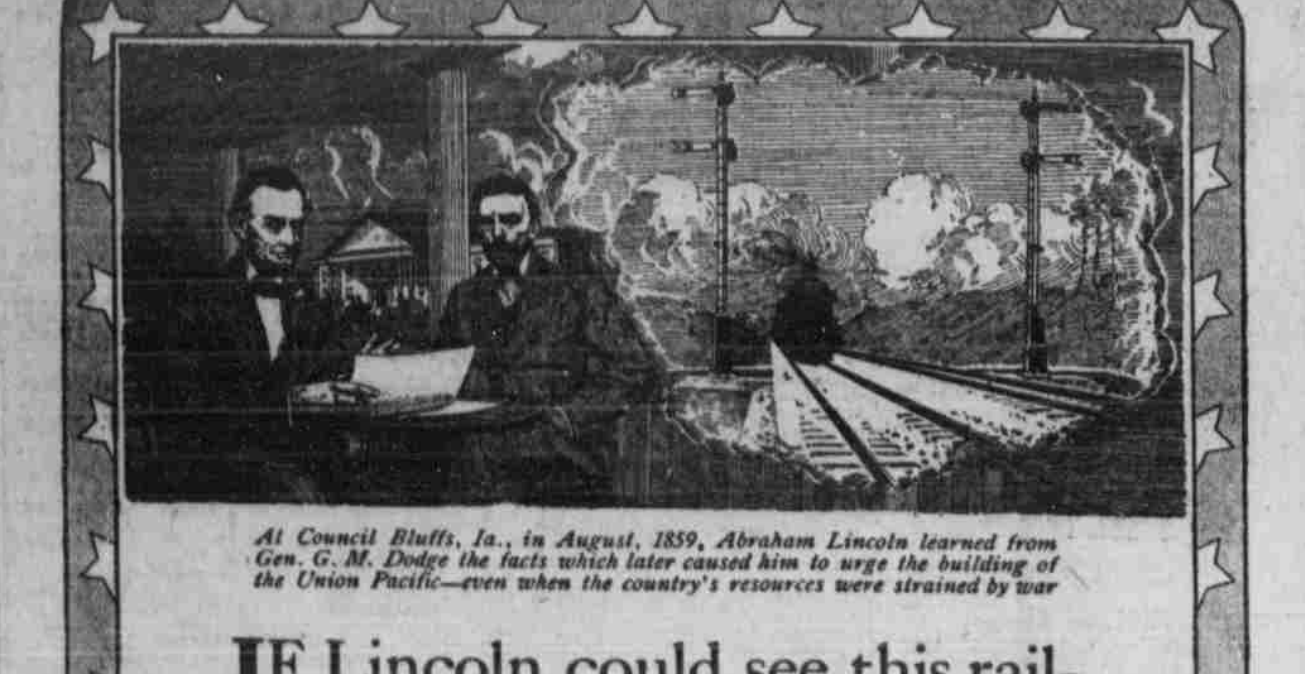
SYNOPSIS. Mary Page, actress, is accused of the murder of David Pollock...
