Secretary of State Pool Rules Law Does Not Compel Publication of Ballot.

MOOSERS PLAN THEIR MEETING

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 16.—(Special.)—Secretary of State Pool is of the opinion that the national republican convention, to be held at Fairbury, which was passed by the last legislature is ineffective, so far as the primary is concerned, and the publication of the official ballot in the newspapers. In answer to the inquiry of one county clerk, Mr. Pool says: "You are not authorized to publish the primary election ballot form in newspapers, but should cause to be printed sample ballots on red or green paper as in former years, and in the printing of the official and primary ballots for the primary election to be held April 18, 1916, the names of candidates shall be rotated and not placed alphabetically."

Moosers Meet at Lincoln. The state-wide conference to be held in Lincoln on Tuesday afternoon, February 22, by the progressive party, is for national committee men, delegates to the national convention, eight in number and alternates for the same; also eight presidential electors.

The committee appointed at the Omaha meet last month to look up the matter of candidates for state offices will make its report.

According to a letter sent out by State Chairman Frank P. Corrick, the call for the national convention at Chicago has been received and calls for two delegates at large and one district delegate for each congressional district.

A petition placing the name of J. H. Sweet of Nebraska City on the primary ballot as a candidate for delegate to the national republican convention from the First district, was received at the office of the secretary of state this morning.

Mr. Sweet is editor of the Nebraska City Press and has been in the newspaper game many years.

A petition from Hastings was received this morning by the secretary of state to place the name of Clarence Miles upon the primary ballot as a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. As Mr. Miles has already filed for the nomination it will not be necessary for him to file an acceptance.

Miss Lydia Barstler Dead of Her Injuries

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 16.—(Special.)—Miss Lydia Barstler, the nurse at the Lincoln sanitarium who was badly burned by having her clothing ignited from a gas stove, died this morning at 6 o'clock after acute suffering.

Miss Barstler was formerly a nurse in the Clarkson hospital at Omaha and left there about three years ago to come to Lincoln. Her home is in Nebraska City, and the body was taken there for burial this afternoon. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock Friday.

Wachob of Omaha was accepted by the county commissioners yesterday for the bonds issued by Lincoln county, the proceeds of which are to be used in the construction of a bridge across the South Platte river near Sutherland, Neb. The East St. Louis Construction company of St. Louis, Mo., was the successful bidder for the building of the bridge. The St. Louis company's bid was selected from among fourteen others.

High Price for Farm.

CENTRAL CITY, Feb. 16.—(Special.)—Real estate values in Merrick county have found a new high water mark, the Frank Tooley farm, located one and one-half miles south of this city, having been bought of H. A. Bay of Harlan, Ia., for a consideration of \$175 per acre. Possession will be given March 1. This deal was engineered by the State Real Estate and Investment company of this city.

Hammond Speaks at North Bend.

NORTH BEND, Neb., Feb. 16.—(Special.)—Ross Hammond, editor of the Fremont Tribune, was the principal speaker at a "dry" mass meeting here Monday night, at which a local organization was effected. These officers were elected: Alex Thom, president; E. W. Young, vice president; H. Cusack, secretary, and James Harvie, treasurer.

Delegate Petitions Circulated in Hall

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Feb. 16.—(Special Telegram.)—Petitions were in circulation here today for W. J. Bryan, W. H. Thompson, I. Piatt and J. J. Thomas as delegates-at-large to the national democratic convention and Peter Shea and Mr. Swanson as delegates from the Fifth congressional district. These petitions were circulated by Mr. Carr, father of Dr. E. Arthur Carr of Lincoln, who likewise some days ago circulated petitions for Charles Bryan of Lincoln for governor and for Governor Morehead for United States senator.

DIME IMBEDDED IN HORSE'S SHOULDER 23 YEARS

RAVENNA, Neb., Feb. 16.—(Special.)—One of the old-time cures for "awoney" shoulders on horses was brought to mind here yesterday by the death of Ernest Skochedpoie's faithful old driving horse. Twenty-three years ago the shoulder of this horse was lanced and a new dime placed in the wound to cause the flesh to grow back in natural form. A small lump on the shoulder always remained, and yesterday after the horse had died this lump was cut open. Aside from being black in color the coin was not disfigured. The date—1892—is as plain as on a new coin. The owner regards the coin as a valuable relic, having placed it in the wound himself and thereafter having faithful service from the horse for more than a score of years.

Mrs. C. A. Hall, wife of the cashier of the Citizens' State bank at Virginia, died yesterday afternoon at her home at that place following a long illness from pneumonia. She was 22 years of age.

Mrs. J. C. Winkle, a pioneer of Gage county, died yesterday afternoon at her home, fourteen miles southwest of Beatrice, of pneumonia, aged 78 years. She is survived by one daughter and four sons.

OPPOSE CHANGE IN 20-TON BRIDGE LAW

Nebraska Threshermen in Arms at Action of the Last Legislature.

DIRECT BLOW AT THE INDUSTRY

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 16.—(Special Telegram.)—"If a private individual would run his business as the state runs its business, he would be bankrupt in a month," said C. H. Gustafson, president of the Association of Nebraska Threshermen, in his opening address before that organization, which is holding its annual session at the Lincoln hotel.

President Gustafson was very emphatic in his remarks and insisted that threshermen like all good citizens should take an interest in seeing that good men were placed in the business offices of the state.

The association is very much against the action of the last legislature, which repealed the twenty-ton bridge law, or amended it in such a way that it now is only necessary to build bridges which will hold up fifteen tons.

This the threshermen declare is a blow at the threshing industry as the future calls for heavier machines for threshing and bridges should be strong enough to hold up the modern machines.

Prof. Chase of the state farm urged the threshermen, who owned engines, to use them in hauling their grain to market. "You men have the engines, then why not use them instead of having them standing idle most of the year," said he. "Besides it is a help to the roads."

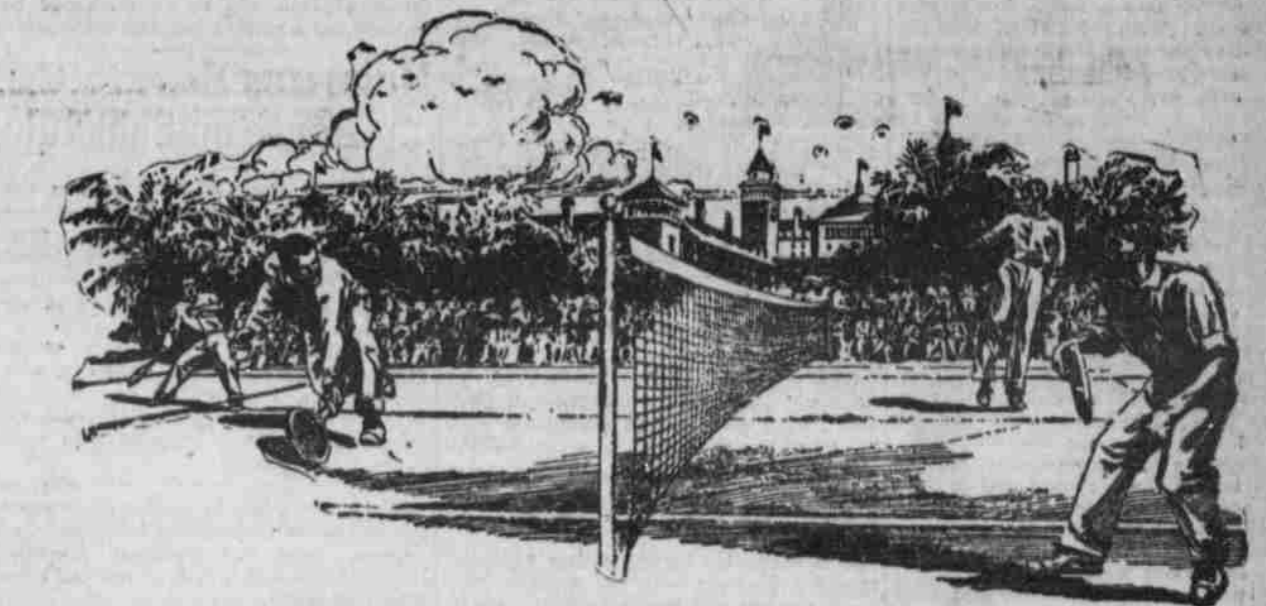
