HAPPENINGS IN THE MAGIC CITY

Two Men Caught by Dr. De T. in Act of Riding Away in H. Car.

PUT UP FIGHT UPON THE STREET

Caught in the automobile of Dr. E. L. DeLaney in the center of a throng of people at Twenty-fourth and N streets last evening shortly before 9 o'clock, James J. Gillan, stockman, who lives in Sarpy county, and a worker, who gave his name as C. D. Craig, 244 Pinkney street, were arrested, last evening by Captain of Police John Briggs and Officers Grace and Baughman. The doctor was just coming from the door of his office when he espied two men seated in his radiator which stood at the curb, the engine throbbing under the hand of one of the two.

Before they were able to start the machine he had them under hand and with the help of several pedestrians was able to hold them while one telephoned for the police. Both men had been drinking. They admitted their guilt and were released on request of the doctor, after the latter returned from the station.

A large crowd gathered to see the arrest in the heart of the business district. When the streets were filled with people, it was the first time that two men had been caught in the act of riding away in an automobile not their own.

Drug Store Raided.

A quantity of morphine, cocaine and other drugs besides a bicycle and a pair of shoes were stolen in a raid by thieves at the Maple avenue drug store at 6102 South Eighteenth street sometime between April 26 and May 3. Mr. Hultineau, proprietor of the place, reported the losses to the police.

The home of the rector of St. Mary's Episcopal church at 214 J. street, was entered and robbed by unidentified thieves yesterday and a black wallet containing 25 cents, a black leather handbag valued at \$10 or \$12, besides many important papers, were stolen. Reports of the thefts have been placed on file at the station.

Narrowly Escapes Injury.

Used apparently from under the very wheels of a passing street car at the west end of the Q street viaduct on the Twelfth and Q street crossing, Joe Killip, 215 Q street, narrowly escaped his life to Officer John Zaludek, who spotted the man in the darkness before the oncoming car. Detectives Fleming and Sullivan who happened along at the time assisted the officer in steering the man to safety.

German Note is Not Fully Satisfactory To Press of Britain

LONDON, May 6.—Interest with which Germany's reply to the United States was awaited here could hardly have been exceeded in America. All the evening newspapers yesterday printed the note prominently by sections in successive editions. The greatest curiosity was expressed as to the reception of the note by the United States. The morning newspapers almost without exception print editorials on the note and express more or less decided opinions on it.

"It can only mean a break between America and Germany," says the Daily News.

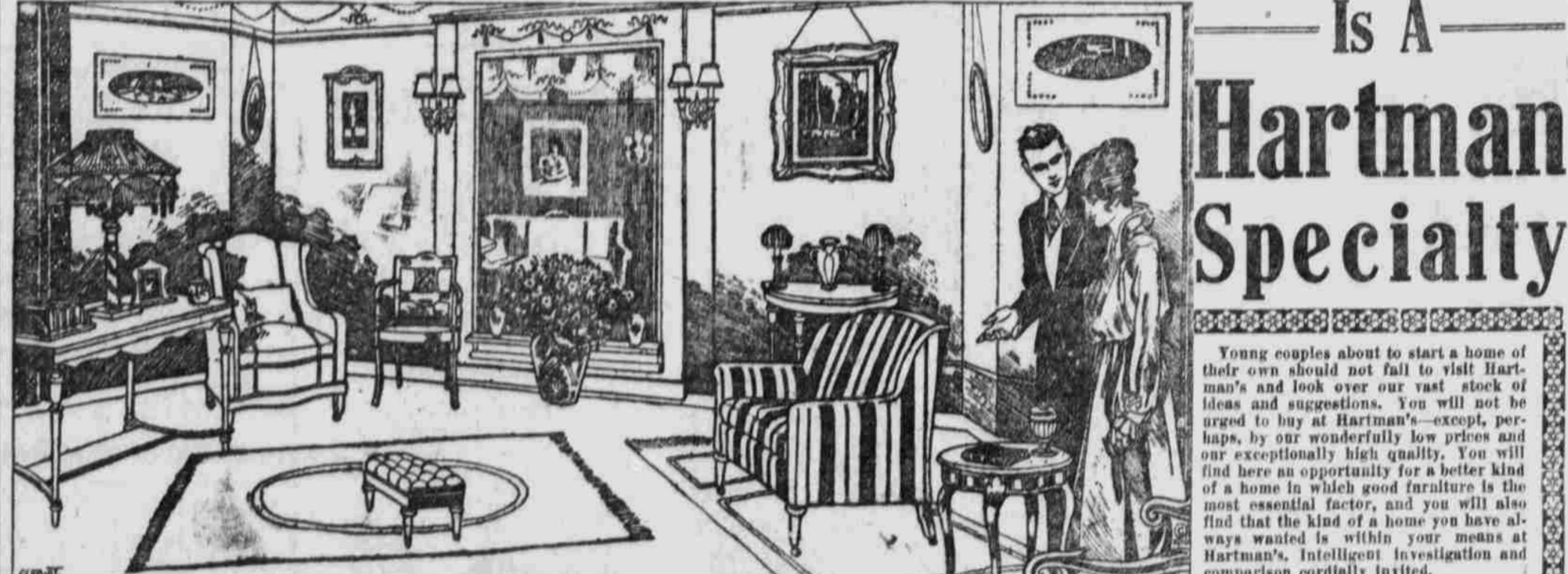
