New York, March 15.—Despite the handicaps imposed by adverse domestic and foreign factors, boday's duli market ruled firm to strong, though loxing considerable ground in the later dealings. Prices were at their best during the mid-session, when recess in the railway labor confarance was announced, but fell back all around in the final hour of seiling, apparently induced by the reports of the revolution in Russia.

Trading was broad, considering the comparatively small, teurn-over, dealings embracing more than the issual variety of industrials and metals with a fair sprinkling of specialities. Bethleshom Steel, new and old shares, the latter seiling ex-dividend of 10 per cent, made extreme gains of 2% and 4½, respectively at 116½ and 12½, United States Steel rose 1½ to 111½, but closed at 110, and gains in other sizel and from issues suffered like -reductions.
Cappers rose 1 to 2 points, with General Loather, Industrial Alcohol, American Can and International Nickel, Sugar and Paper shares, were irregular throughout.

The movement in utilities was limited, the only features being an extreme rise of 6¼ in Ohio Gas to 112½ with 15-5 for West-ern Union at 95%.
