CHEVROLET MAKES FAST TIME ON OVAL

Intrepid Louis Qualifies at 109 Miles Per Hour and Leads in Fight for the Pole Position.

By whizzing around the saucer at the dizzy clip of 109 miles an hour, Louis Chevrolet, intrepid Frenchman, qualified his 1,600-pound Frontenac yesterday afternoon and leads in the fight for the pole position in the third annual Omaha Speedway classic, July 4.

Louis turned his qualifying lap in 41 and 2-5 seconds. Few in the grandstand realized the terrific rate at which he was traveling. His lap was just two miles an hour than Ralph Mulford's record-breaking lap last year.

Chevrolet has two more chances to qualify and he hopes to better Mulford's mark.

Joe Thomas in a Mercer and Dave Lewis in a Hoskins Special, are tied for second position in the elimination. Both negotiated a lap in 42 and 2-5 seconds, an average of 107 miles an hour.

Hearne Ranks Fourth.

Eddie Hearne with a Duesenberg, ranks fourth with an average of 103 miles per hour and Walter Haines in a Mercer is fifth. He qualified at 102 miles per hour.

Tommy Milton, despite the fact that he is using a block which must be changed before the race, qualified his Duesenberg at 101 miles per hour.

Baby Pete Henderson, Duesenberg, and Harry Mason, Ogren, both qualified at 100 miles an hour. Omar Toft and Andy Burt fell below the century mark, but hope to equal it in their subsequent attempts.

TUG-O-WAR IS WON BY DENVER COPPERS

Mile High City Police Team Defeat Omaha Champion Pullers in One Hour Forty-One Minutes.

Denver, July 1.—(Special Telegram.)—Omaha lost the championship of the United States here last night in the tug-o-war contest between its police force team and a team selected from the Denver police force.

It was nearly midnight when the contest ended, following a steady pull for one hour, forty-one minutes and thirty-nine seconds.

Two previous contests have been held by the opposing teams. Denver won the first in one hour and fifty-seven minutes and in a return match at Omaha on April 27, the Omaha team won the pull in eight minutes and a half.

In tonight's contest the visitors won a lead of nearly eight inches at the start, which they held for thirty minutes. They gradually increased their lead to sixteen inches before the end of the first hour. The Omaha men blundered by merely sitting down on their advantage for many minutes, during which the local team rested. Finally, starting in to regain what they had lost, suddenly and without warning they worked the ribbon by three long, steady pulls to within less than three feet of their opponents' goal at the starting point. The ribbon remained at the starting point for about ten minutes, when Omaha secured another few inches. They had then been pulling one hour and seven minutes. Denver from that time watched closely to secure every advantage, finally starting the pull that ended the contest.

DEMO CONGRESSMEN TRIM G. O. P. PLAYERS

Republicans Take Short End of 21 to 22 Score in Annual House Base Ball Contest.

Washington, July 1.—In the presence of President Wilson, members of the cabinet and other high officials, the house of representatives democratic base ball team yesterday defeated the republican team, 22 to 21 in a benefit base ball game for the Red Cross.

The game lasted three hours and twenty-three minutes and netted about \$3,000 in cash and many thousands of laughs. Only forty-five errors were made by the two teams, leaving the old record of fifty-six undisturbed, but leaders of both sides pointed out that not a ball was caught by an outfielder on either team, a showing never duplicated in the many house base ball contests.

The democrats came from behind for their victory. Representative Gard of Ohio, started a batting rally in the sixth inning with the score 13 to 6 in the republicans' favor and wit Representative Muir of Maryland, an old college pitcher, mowing down democratic batters regularly.
