Interest created by the return of Miss Hazel Silver, soprano, and the first appearance in Omaha of Mrs. Mabel Woodworth Jensen, violinist, brought a representative audience to the First Methodist church last even-

Her voice, naturally of lovely quality, has grown fuller and broader and it is beautifully even throughout its wide range. Her pianissimo work was a constant delight. Of the first group, "Have You Seen but a Whyte Lillie Grow," an old English song of tenderest sentiment, was sung with much tonal beauty and was an exquisite number, well suited to Miss Silver's voice. Of the French group, "Romance," by Debussy and "Ritournelle," by Chaminade, especially pleased the writer.

Miss Silver was at her best in the last group, and particularly in "Butterflies," by Seiler, a novelty to Omaha programs, and a dainty, picturesque number in both the voice part and the accompaniment. This was sung with charming effect. A wide contrast was provided by "Bird of the Wilderness," by Horsmann, the closing numher, which gave Miss Silver opportunity for some splendid sustained legato and a broad line in her interpretation. Her many friends welcomed her cordially and an encore was graciously given after each group.

In Mrs. Jensen the audience discovered a violinist of distinction. She is possessed of an abundance of temperament, tone and technic, and conveys a thrill to the audience by means both Thursday and Friday evening. of them. Her tone is broad and virile and of lovely singing quality. She plays with breadth or briliancy as the occasion requires, and her interpretations are artistic and assured. The eautiful and difficult "Ave Maria" by Schubert-Wilhelmj was given a convincing interpretation, and the fiery "Spanish Dance" by Sarasate, which followed, brought as an encore a most artistic performance of "Orientale" by Ces.r Cui. Her second group contained other interesting and effective numbers, "A Slavonic Dance" by Dvorak-Kreisler, a peacetul "Berceuse" with many fascinating harmonics, and a dashing and vital "Polonaise" by Wieniawski, "Deep River"


