BRADSTREET'S REVIEW OF TRADE. Cheerful Feeling Due to Success of Allied Arms Boosts Business.

Cheerful Feeling Due to Success of Allied Arms Boosts Business.

New York, Nov. 23.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say:

More cheerful feeling, probably horn of the reported successes of the allied arms overseas, apparently completion of stock market liquidation, heavy government buying, the return of Liberty loan money into circulation, 3-cent cotton, unrestricted ordering by the excellently situated surplus crop senes, reported high bank clearances and super-animated activity in most industrial lines turning out essentials of war are factors that easily eclipse say lagging tendencies that prevail. In a number of lines, and more especially in the east, buying for civilian account perforce reflects a pause, this being largely due to the fact that the government's wants receive preference and gartely to the apparent inability of ordinary restail trade to caliven at a time when foodstuffs are inordinately high, when various campaigns to encourage economy are index way, and when, too, the ordinary man in the street is paying for Liberty beinds in installments. However, the predictors spendings of the government quicken movement in general and render the observer practically oblivious to the enforced prudsuce of the ordinary trader. Yet in the faces of conservatism normal wants are sufficient to make up a relatively large volume, and, alguificantly enough, parts of the west, southwest and most of the south disclose the best trade movements and collections ever experienced, demand being for immediate, as well as for distant delivery. There are no surplus stocks of manufactured goods, and, as amplies of fuel, labor and railway care are insufficient, production cannot very well be speeded up. It is true that the labor aituation has improved in spots, due to the cutting down of denessentials, but this improvement is not likely to be lasting or substantial.
