Unusual Demand. Chicago, Feb. 15 .- New car supply rules intended to build up stocks here proved a nearly complete offset today for signs that demand for corn was more than keep-ing pace with receipts. The result was a steady close at the same as yesterday's fin-ish to 4c higher, with March \$1.274 and May \$1.26. In oats the outcome ranged from %c decline to %c decline. The market, however, promptly eased off after the issuance of instructions that grain cars emplied here must not be re-loaded for shipment east but must be returned to western lines in order to bring corn to terminal.

Commission house buying carried cats to the highest prices yet this season, but a sharp reaction followed. Profit taking appeared to be chiefly responsible for the setback, but the strength in Liberty bonds and in the New York stock market was also
