

### Big Increase In Railway Earnings Reported for July

Report to Commerce Commission on 202 Roads Shows Largest Receipts Since Last October.

Washington, Sept. 10.—Railroads of the country had an operating income in July of \$69,485,000, the largest since last October and \$17,000,000 more than in June, the Association of Railway Executives announced on the basis of reports filed with the Interstate Commerce commission. The earnings, a statement by the association said, were at the annual rate of 4 1/2 per cent on the tentative valuation fixed by the commission for rate-making purposes. The computations were based on reports from 202 Class 1 railroads having a total mileage of 235,641. Fifty-seven roads failed to earn their operating expenses and taxes during the month, as compared with 72 in June. Operating expenses of western roads decreased 11.8 per cent and their expenses 26.7 per cent in July. Their net operating income was \$33,781,000, as compared with \$5,194,000 in July, 1920. "The total operating revenues for July," the statement said, "amounted to \$462,953,000, a decrease of \$66,000,000, or 12 1/2 per cent compared with July, 1920, although the rates are now on a higher basis. Operating expenses were \$362,776,000, a reduction of \$151,000,000, or 29.4 per cent. The net operating income compares with a deficit of \$11,878,000 for July, 1920."

### If You Want to Be Full of Pep, Eat Spinach, Tomatoes

This Is Advice of Aksel G. Olsen, Former Omahan, Who Has Just Completed Research Work Into Vitamine, Without Which Pigeons Die and Pigs Lose Weight.

If you want to be full of pep, eat tomatoes and spinach. This is the advice of Aksel G. Olsen, formerly of Omaha, but now assistant in chemistry at Nebraska Wesleyan college, University Place, Neb., who has completed a summer's research work into the elusive vitamine at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis. His studies were under the supervision of Dr. Ross A. Gortner, probably the greatest authority on the vitamine in the country. Important for Babies. "I found out that the old idea that every man has to eat his peck of dirt a pretty good one, after all," he said. "If animals are fed chemically pure foods they become ill and die. This is important in the feeding of babies, and in animal husbandry. For instance, ordinary pasteurized milk is lacking in vitamins, and babies get scurvy from drinking it. If milk is boiled slowly the vitamine content is destroyed, but if it is boiled rapidly the vitamine content is not seriously affected. Pure Food Kills Pigeons. "In one of the experiments pigeons were fed with polished rice, a chemically pure food. They became nervous and finally died, following a nervous attack which lasted ordinarily about a minute. If they were permitted to eat a small amount of green foods containing vitamins, however, or a little milk, they became normal within half an hour. "Two batches of hogs from the same litter were used in another experiment. One was fed only on corn, the other on corn and powdered milk. The hogs on the powdered milk diet were nearly ready for market when I left. The others had failed to gain in weight for several weeks. They were starved for want of vitamins. To Cure Bow Legs. Tomatoes and spinach, Mr. Olsen repeated, are the best vitamine foods in the average diet. "If your children are bow legged, feed 'em cod liver oil," he added with a twinkle in his eye. "Cod liver oil," he explained, "contains an anti-rickets vitamine, which is very beneficial to the condition. One of the professors at the university declared he could cure every case of rickets in St. Paul and Minneapolis for \$5,000—spent for cod liver oil." Two Years in Army. ### State Officers Open Probe of Mine Trouble; Men Return to Homes

Elizabethtown, Ill., Sept. 10.—Adj. Gen. Frank S. Dickson, George Arnold, state director of labor, and Robert Medill, director of mines and minerals, arrived to investigate reports of disorders in the fluor spar mining district as personal representatives of Governor Len Small. Arriving overland from Harrisburg, Equality, Kedron and Karber Ridge in the coal fields to the north the investigating committee found no trace of armed strike sympathizers who Wednesday were marching on this town and Rosiclare. Deputy sheriffs who penetrated the wooded districts north of here at dawn scoured the backwoods without finding a trace of the army yesterday estimated at from 500 to 800 men. General Dickson and his associates conferred with Sheriff Cox and State's Attorney Clarence Howard and tomorrow will begin hearing other witnesses representing both sides.
