

# Hal Mahone Wiggles to First Money at Opening of Ak-Sar-Ben Race Meeting

## Childs Pilots Pacer to Win in Feature Event

### George Brandeis' Entry Is Pushed Hard to Wire by Johnnie Quirk—Kilo Watts Winner.

Two Omaha owned horses, Hal Mahone 2:01 1/2, owned by George Brandeis and Kilo Watts, owned by Tom Dennis and Bert Murphy, both driven by an Omaha man, Marvin Childs, carried off the major share of the winnings at the first day of the Ak-Sar-Ben Great Western circuit races at Ak-Sar-Ben track yesterday afternoon.

The track was in excellent condition, considering the rains of the last two or three days, and while a bit heavy in places, any horse really expected to see. And the Omaha people turned out surprisingly well, considering the weather indications. It looked like a slim crowd after the first race was called shortly after 2 o'clock in the afternoon, but by the time the program was under way, the stand was at least two-thirds filled, with a liberal sprinkling on the paddock in front of the stand. Secretary Trimble said at least 5,000 people entered the turnstiles during the afternoon.

### Russell Boy Gets Pole.

Russell Boy drew the pole in the first race. Starter F. E. Stone started the field a couple of times and then sent them away with the pole horse back a length when they got the word. Johnnie Quirk was in second position, with Hal Mahone in third place and Kilo Watts on the outside. Childs dropped to second place when Hal Mahone on the first turn and they were strung out at the half, with Hal Mahone still in second place. Marvin started his drive for first place as the field headed into the lower turn and had taken the contending by the time the second-eighths pole was passed. Russell Boy came strong and bid for second money through the stretch, but Johnnie Quirk had the steam to stave off the rush and the son of Rustic Patented had to be contented with third. Johnnie Quirk was coming strong at the finish, but Hal Mahone won handsily, with some left.

In the second heat Johnnie Quirk took the lead early in the heat, with Hal Mahone in second place at the three-quarters. From there on Childs stepped on the gas and Hal Mahone won handsily, the fight again being for second money through the third and deciding mile. Childs again trailed with Kilo Watts leading to the half, but the latter lacked the steam to stave off the drive of the Omaha horse, Hal Mahone winning handsily in the fastest time of the race, 2:05 1/4, with Russell Boy coming strong and bid for second money through the stretch, but Johnnie Quirk was coming strong at the finish, but Hal Mahone won handsily, with some left.

Two-dollar tickets on Hal Mahone paid \$3.90 to win and \$2.50 to place in the first heat, \$2.60 and \$2.20 in the second heat and \$2.40 and \$2.10 in the third heat, while \$2.50 tickets on Johnnie Quirk paid \$3.50, \$2.30 and \$2.10 respectively in the first, second and third heats. No "show" tickets were sold on any of the heats.

### Four Start in Third Race.

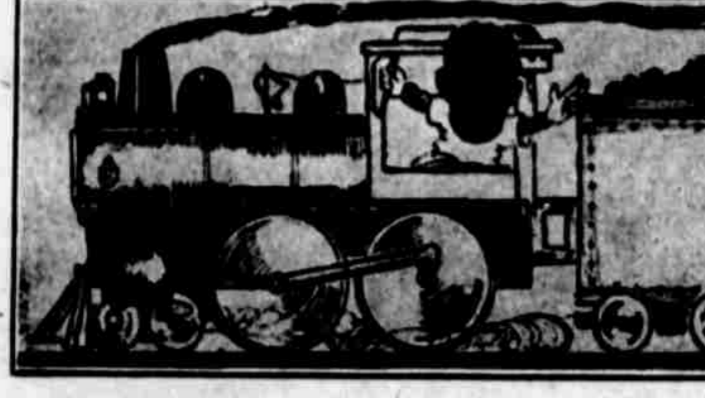
Four horses took the word in the third race on the program, the 2:09 trot, with Voltage, a nice going son of Peter Volo at the pole in the get-away. The field got away to a good start in the first heat, on about the third score, with Childs driving Kilo Watts going to the front before the quarter was reached. At the half Childs was still in the lead, with Dorothy Day in second place and Voltage trailing. Peter Kingston went to a hard first in the field, headed into the first turn, and the rest of the bunch were out of his reach before Taylor could get him flattened out again. Childs had it all his own way with Kilo Watts, but Dorothy Day made a hard try for the third score, with Childs driving Voltage also showed plenty of steam, coming up on the outside and trying hard for second money. Peter Kingston was distanced.

Childs again took Kilo Watts out in front in the second mile, with Dorothy Day a close second at the half. Thomas made a strong bid for first money again in the stretch, coming down on the outside but local mare had plenty of steam and wolver handily. Voltage was again a contender for second money, coming through on the rail and it looked for a little while as though he had it, but dropped back at the distance stand.

In the third heat Childs was leading at the quarter and again at the half. Dorothy Day moved up from third place by the time the journey was over, and it was a hard fight in the stretch, but the local mare won easily.

Two-dollar tickets on Kilo Watts in the first heat, \$2.80 to win and \$2.20 to place, and about the same in the third heat. Dorothy Day paid \$2.30 to place in the first heat.
