

Copper Company Merger Plan Is Being Proposed

Phelps-Dodge Co. Makes Proposition to Take Over English Company's Holdings in Arizona.

New York, Sept. 23.—The Phelps-Dodge corporation, it was learned here today, has made a proposition to take over the mines and railroads of the Arizona Copper company in Arizona on the basis of an exchange of the Arizona company's stock for that of the Phelps-Dodge corporation.

The exact terms of the proposed exchange have not been disclosed. Stockholders of the Arizona company are to receive the proposition in Edinburgh on October 3. In trade circles, it is understood the absorption of the foreign-owned company has virtually been completed.

London, Sept. 23.—An Edinburgh dispatch to the London Times says that the directors of the Arizona Copper company in a statement issued to shareholders, announce the terms on which the property in Arizona on the basis of an exchange of the Arizona company's stock for that of the Phelps-Dodge corporation.

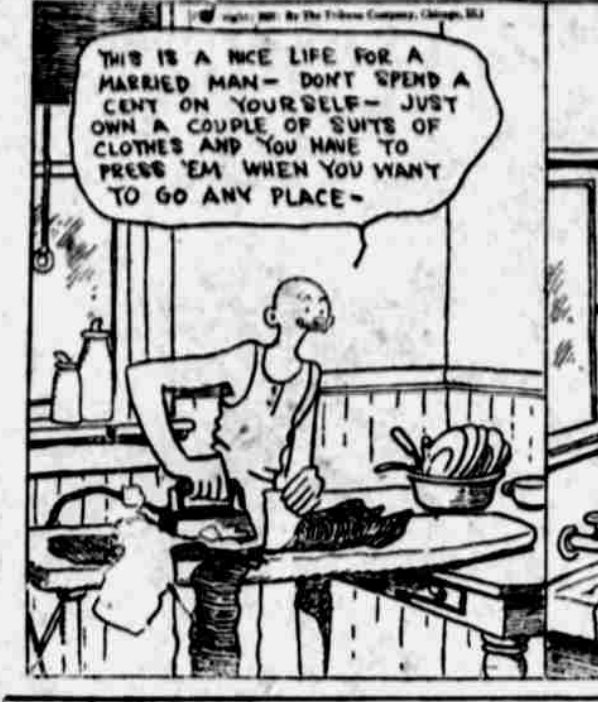
