proceedings within the next few months," said Commissioner Joseph Koutsky, "Cinders will be laid to serve as a temporary surface during winter along Twenty-fourth street, Leavenworth to St. Marys avenue, and early next spring this will be paved to a width of 100 feet."

The new concrete base has been

laid on St. Marys avenue to Twenty-fourth street. The brick surface will follow immediately.

to Laird. Officers of the Baum store in Omaha said he had been in the store several times, but they did not know where he had gone, which fact added to the mystery surrounding

the private detectives. The late James E. Baum left no will, according to the records in the county court. His estate was estimated at \$250,000.
