

### Repaving 24th Street To Be Put Off Until Spring

Delay in St. Marys Avenue Improvement Project Necessitated by Plan to Widen Street.

Twenty-fourth street, from Leavenworth street to St. Marys avenue, will not be repaved this season, on account of the prospective widening of this strip. This will be the only part of the St. Marys avenue hill improvement project that will be held over until next spring.

"We will complete the widening proceedings within the next few months," said Commissioner Joseph Koutsky. "Cinders will be laid to serve as a temporary surface during winter along Twenty-fourth street, Leavenworth to St. Marys avenue, and early next spring this will be paved to a width of 100 feet."

The new concrete base has been laid on St. Marys avenue to Twenty-fourth street. The brick surface will follow immediately.

### Detectives Find Man Missing for Two Weeks Registered at Hotel

Richard T. Baum, one of the leading heirs to the estate of the late James E. Baum of New York, president of the Baum Iron Works, for whom detectives have been searching in Omaha for two weeks, was found yesterday by them at a hotel.

Baum checked out of the Hotel Fontenelle, September 21, and was reported missing shortly after. He added to Room Clerk Laird of the hotel, who stated the man left no forwarding address when he departed.

When the detectives appeared yesterday, they questioned Laird closely regarding Baum's movements in Omaha. He came here from Wyoming and had spent about two weeks at the Fontenelle, according to Laird.

Officers of the Baum store in Omaha said he had been in the store several times, but they did not know where he had gone, which fact added to the mystery surrounding the private detectives.

The late James E. Baum left no will, according to the records in the county court. His estate was estimated at \$250,000.
