

Tax on Alcoholic Spirits Is Boosted Under New Tax Act

Increase to \$4 a Gallon Agreed Upon by G. O. P. Leaders - Will Not Increase Postage Rates.

Washington, Oct. 7.—A tax of \$4 a gallon on all alcoholic spirits withdrawn from bond for industrial, medicinal or any other purposes, has been agreed upon by republican leaders as a part of the new tax revision program.

The proposal to repeal the \$2,000 exemption allowed corporations was abandoned on the ground that it would work too great a hardship on the smaller corporations.

A maximum income surtax rate of 50 per cent will apply in the case of incomes in excess of \$200,000 instead of \$500,000 as proposed by the democratic senators.

Decision has been reached, leaders said, to repeal \$400,000 of the nuisance taxes, but just which of these taxes are to go has not been finally decided.

It was said there would be no increase in the first class postage rates, discussed yesterday as a possibility, and leaders have not in mind imposing any new taxes.

The program as drawn by leaders, which includes repeal of the excess profit taxes next January 1 and retention of the capital stock tax, is to be laid before majority members of the senate finance committee late today.

Crash With Auto Truck Charging the Farmers Lumber company and the city of Omaha with negligence, Clarence Turpin, a minor, by his attorney, Bertie C. Turpin, brought suit in district court yesterday asking for \$20,000 damages.

Man Shot by Roommate On Road to Recovery After hovering between life and death for several days as the result of a gun-shot wound through the abdomen, said to have been inflicted by George Davenport, his roommate, Joe Barnett, automobile accessory salesman, now is reported on the road to recovery at St. Joseph hospital. He will be able to leave the hospital in a week or 10 days, it is said.

Barnett and Davenport came to Omaha September 25, and rented a room at 211 North Eighteenth street. The men quarreled over money and liquor, Barnett told.

Barnett's home is in Garfield, Ark. Davenport was arrested.

Federal Agent Stopped With Negro Dope Suspect Joseph A. Manning, federal narcotic agent, struggled for several minutes Thursday night with Jessie Reed, negro, known as "Big Jess," before he could arrest him on a charge of illegal drug possession.

When Manning entered her home at 1015 Capitol avenue, Jessie made an attempt to destroy some dope she had in her pocket. Manning saved the evidence.

South Side Red Cross Man Will Speak on First Aid To Postal Employees In accordance with the plan of the United States postal department, in co-operation with the American Red Cross society, to organize welfare societies in the post offices of the nation, Capt. G. R. T. Fisher of the Omaha Red Cross will deliver a lecture today at noon to employees of the South Side postoffice on the "Possibility of First Aid Knowledge."

The lecture will be given with practical demonstrations to furnish instructions to letter carriers and other employees of the postoffice on methods of first aid in case of accident. It is pointed out that a letter carrier on his rounds often sees accidents in which he could aid if possessed of advice on treatment, and employees of a postoffice could be of service in case of sudden illness or accident among workers.

The library has a list of 100 titles for 1922 and residents of the South Side are requested to notify Miss Anderson as to their wants.

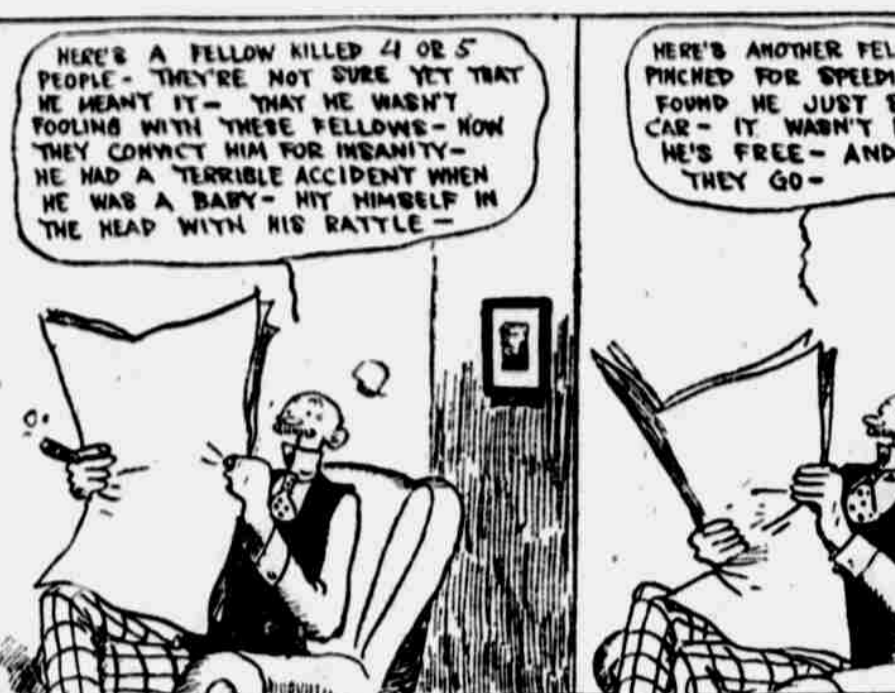
