## German Problem **Biggest Factor in Trade Situation**

Entire Field of Exports and Imports Affected Unfavorably by Undervaluation Of Mark.

By HOLLAND.

Men of business life and of important financial undertakings whose opinions are worth while heeding appear to be more greatly concerned over the German situation than over any other at the present time. They are unanimous in the view that three powerful factors in the restoration of prosperity are likely to be influenced, possibly seriously im-paired, by the German situation. For this reason they look upon the unprecedented and abnormal effort which Germany is now making to command world markets and to secure means by which her future enormous reparations can be paid as perhaps the most important subject for world and especially for United States consideration.

States consideration.

The three factors necessary to influence so that they will have abundant strength are, first, the contemplated reduction of armaments; second, the new tariff law and, third, American industry. For it seems to be the belief of those who have given much thought to the subject that it will be impossible to reach satisfactory adjustment of the so-called disarmament or reduction or armaments, plan which is to be considered at the meeting of world representatives at Washington is mild-November, unless the humane present policy is also carefully considered. It may be that if some agreeable plan for reduction of armaments is reached that will aid Germany in such way as also to aid the rest of the world. For it armaments be reduced an equivalent reduction of national expenses should follow. It will be impossible in the opinion of men whose views have been ontained to frame a satisfactory tariff bill until the German problem, which now seems unsolvable, is satisfactorily answered. This is said to involve the interests of American industry because by reason of the undervaluation of the German mark, which normally is equivalent to about 25 cents as compared with the American dollar, the entire field of exports and imports is affected and many kinds of American industry may be impaired, some of them in fact compelled to suspend operation.





The powers do not seem particularly eager to accept this tempting offer—perhaps because the price asked is too high, perhaps because the price asked is too high, perhaps because of ressoned doubt as to whether the soviet's "recognition" of the debt would be anything more than a compliment, But the Wall street end of the incident drew attention to the price of the "ruble paper."

As most people know the Russian "ruble notes" which are sold on Wall street, are not the product of the bolshevist printing press, A cable from Moscow today gave the total of the paper currency put out by the soviet at the interesting sum of 5,750,000,000,000 rubles, or at the ruble's parity value, not quite three trillion dollars. There is no reason to doubt the figure; for both the Russian news. papers and some of the Americans returning from Russia agree in stating that \$2.000 American maney would lately buy 100,000,000 bolshevik rubles.

But this would mean a market value of only a three hundredth part of the Wall street "ruble note" quotation. The reason is that Wall street buys and sells only "per-evolution" currency, whose total never went above 17,800,000 rubles.
