

### City Elections Show Hard Fight on Bond Issues

#### Kearney Returns to Councilmanic Form of Government—Fremont Opposes Swimming Pool.

Fremont, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—For the second time within a year the voters refused to approve a bond issue for a municipal swimming pool. The \$25,000 issue was defeated in all four wards of the city by a vote of 827 to 726. William F. Johnson, Fred Drew, F. A. Hick and R. B. Miller defeated J. C. Ager, W. C. Wiley, Soren Nelson and Chris Rasmussen for positions on the city council. D. D. Rowe and C. H. Christensen were elected members of the school board, defeating S. A. Preston from the race.

Last spring the Rotary club, Kiwanis club, Central Labor union and Woman's club promoted a campaign to build a recreation park and swimming pool. The city of too much taxes defeated the proposition last fall. The same organizations tried the swimming pool issue again, but the voters plainly showed that they refused to shoulder additional taxes at the present time. The defeat of the issue came as a big surprise.

#### University Place Beats Annexation

Lincoln, April 5.—The suburban town of University Place, seat of Nebraska Wesleyan university, voted decisively yesterday against annexation to Lincoln. Nearly complete, but unofficial returns show the ratio to be nearly two to one. The city of Lincoln took no part in the contest. The town of Bethany, where is located Cotner college, voted strongly in favor of annexation, but will be deferred from consolidation with the city because it is not contiguous territory. University Place lying between Lincoln and Bethany.

#### Sunday Baseball Banned by 11 Votes at Tecumseh

Tecumseh, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—The contest in Tecumseh yesterday was on members of the school board and the playing of baseball on Sunday. D. W. Hurst for mayor, W. J. Deveney for clerk, I. M. Davis for treasurer, and A. K. Taylor for engineer were re-elected without opposition. H. S. James was elected member of the council in the first ward, Charles Dickman in the second, and Jay L. Jobs in the third ward. A. N. Deice and E. C. Hedrick were elected members of the school board and the playing of Sunday baseball was defeated by 11 votes. The total vote was the largest ever cast in the city.

#### Sunday Baseball Wins in Election at Neligh

Neligh, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—The important features in the city election held here yesterday were those of water extension bonds and Sunday baseball. The bonds carried by a big majority and Sunday baseball received a majority of five votes. The following candidates were elected: S. D. Thornton, mayor; Wynan C. Graves, city clerk; S. I. Nies, treasurer; C. E. Eubank, engineer; Ben Brodersen, councilman first ward; A. E. Gravel, councilman second ward; T. C. Kirk, John W. Lamson and Fred Penn, board of education.

#### Dr. R. P. Gilligan Elected Mayor by Voters of O'Neill

O'Neill, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Dr. R. P. Gilligan was elected mayor of O'Neill yesterday. John Gallagher was elected city clerk; C. P. Hancock, treasurer; Thomas Birmingham, councilman first ward; George Bay, second ward; Mike Johnson, third ward. The only contest was for school board. No candidates had filed and names had to be written in. The Woman's club slate, Miss Anna O'Donnell and Charles B. Scott were elected.

#### Vote Street Carnivals Out at Aurora; Large Vote Cast

Aurora, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—T. M. Scott was elected mayor of Aurora yesterday by the decisive vote of 657 to 199 for Ed R. Williams. The proposition to prohibit the holding of street carnivals was carried by a vote of 592 to 235. The election called out the largest vote for years.

#### Return to Council

Kearney, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Kearney is scheduled to go back to the councilmanic form of government after six years under the commission system. At a special election, held today, the commission form was defeated by more than two to one, only one ward giving it a slight majority.

#### Crete Mayor Unopposed.

Crete, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Frank Kobes, the only

candidate for mayor at the election, and Frank Novak, aspirant for treasurer, also unopposed, furnished the quiet part of the election here, while a spirited contest took place for other offices. C. E. Beals won from Joseph Ulrich for city clerk; Estel Spaul beat Sam West for alderman of the Third ward; Roland bested Tynes in the First ward, and Belka won in the Second.

#### New Party Loses

Geneva, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—The new progressive city party failed to elect any of the city officers, the entire list of the nonpartisan group being successful by safe majorities. The result was: Mayor, R. B. Ogg; clerk, I. T. Fellows; councilmen, first ward, Leroy Loghry; second, D. E. Garrett; third, George White. Two school board members, Dr. Claire Owens and Dr. J. M. S. Cheshire. The "progressive" party was formed after the naming of a ticket by the old party and the new organization endorsed the same clerk and treasurer selected at the first caucus. The contest for mayor and councilmen was energetic and resulted in bringing nearly the entire voting strength of the city to the polls.

#### Defeat Park Bonds

Shelton, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Shelton voters turned down the proposition submitted at the election held here to vote \$5,000 bonds for the purpose of land for a city park. Pool hall licenses carried by the largest majority ever given here. The voters also approved of Sunday night picture shows. A total of 373 votes were cast. R. H. Heney, J. P. Moore and T. G. Tritt were elected members of the village board of trustees and John Rayback and George C. Webster were elected on the board of education.

#### Sunday Baseball Wins.

Pilger, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—An election today in this village voted, 134 to 40, in favor of Sunday baseball. B. C. Cooper and Robert Larson were elected members of the town board and James Doty and Robert Brandt were selected for the school board.

#### Cook Wins at York.

York, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—The city election held yesterday was a very quiet one. George S. Cook was elected city treasurer; C. H. Warner, councilman, first ward; J. W. Barnett, second ward; John Ault, third ward. The proposition to purchase Parks' park and pay \$8,000 for it was defeated almost two to one.

#### Sterling O. K.'s Bonds.

Tecumseh, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—The proposition to bond the village of Sterling, Johnson county, in the sum of \$28,000 for a new system of waterworks was carried yesterday.

#### Volstead Arrested on Booze Charge; His First Name Is Gus

Pender, Neb., April 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Government and county officers found two stills, five barrels of mash and several gallons of liquor in the southwest corner section of Thurston county on premises occupied by a man whose name is Volstead. The defendant has been bound over to district court under the name of Gustaf Volstead. He claims that he was in the business to support his family, but also said he had sold only two gallons during his business career, and also the purchaser had not yet paid for the liquor.

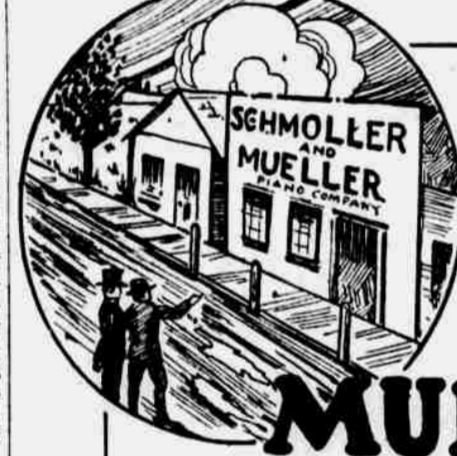
