Mother of First Livingston Becomes **Prison Baby Is** Seeking Parole

Mrs. Rollo De Hart Serving Sentence for Complicity in Murder Near O'Neill Asks Release.

Lincoln, May 20.—(Special.)—Del-la DeHart, mother of Nebraska's first penitentiary baby, will appear before the state board of pardons and pa-roles at the July meeting and ask for a parole, N. T. Harmon, secretary of the board announced today. After the birth of the baby several

months ago, the first plan was to file an application for a pardon. It was decided later that, as her minimum sentence would be served in July to keep her at the orthopedic hospital at Lincoln until then and release Mrs. DeHart through the regular parole channel.

Mrs. DeHart is serving from to 10 years for complicity in the mur-der of John Mize in Holt county. Her husband, Rolla DeHart, is serving life for the same murder and, as yet, has not seen his baby.
