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Editorial Remarks

This morning occurs the second foot ball rally of the year, and it is up to every student and member of the faculty to attend and do all in their power to instill a confidence into the players for their battle with Colorado next Saturday.

Colorado has a heavy team and a good record, and the energetic co-operation of the student body with the men in the line will add to the completeness of the victory—for, while we do not like to boast, we can not anticipate any other result.

If the students will only come out and hear what will be said in chapel this morning and act on the impulses aroused, then there would be no reason for doubt as to the attendance at Saturday's game. Let every student bear in mind the fact that the team needs his support, and if each one does his duty and attends the meeting this morning he will be duly impressed by this fact.

There are five games yet, any one of which is liable to surpass any as yet played and two of which are certain to do so. The interest stirred up at this meeting will have a lasting effect and give impetus to similar movements in the future.

A second request for metallurgists has been received at the executive office and at the headquarters of the chemistry department. Twenty-four men are wanted, graduates preferred.

Rumors are current concerning depredations that the Sophs are planning against the person and property of certain of the Freshmen. Not satisfied with the outcome of last Monday's contest they intend pushing the issue further, holding as their view that no Freshman class should be allowed to administer its affairs unopposed.

One of the most original and novel schemes for pushing any enterprise is the Athletic Carnival that has been arranged by members of the faculty. The fact that a spectacle will actually be furnished of faculty members contesting in athletic sports is a sufficient guarantee of the success of the under-an athletic nature occurred here that taking. The Library Fee.

The University treasurer reports that the sum of \$1,600 will be added this year to the library fund as a result of the one dollar charged to each student not paying some kind of a laboratory fee, as a library fee.

For some time there has been a strong feeling among many members of the faculty that some plan should be devised by means of which the departmental libraries could be made stronger. The great need was for duplicates of the volumes most in demand and for volumes to replace those too badly worn for further service.

Some years ago each of the departments decided upon the fees thought necessary to be charged in its own domain. The results were submitted to the faculty and their recommendation sent to the board of regents which acted upon them. However, the growth of the university has been so rapid and the necessity for the formation of new departments and schools requiring laboratory work so pressing that a special committee was appointed by the regents to take charge of the fixing of fees for the entire institution.

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enrolled in the colleges pay this fee. Those in the schools do not pay, but they are required to pay laboratory fees. Those paying the library fee for the most part use the books frequently and are taking work in the literary groups.

All the money secured by means of this fee is used to swell the library fund that is devoted to the purchase of books most badly needed.

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
