Editorial Remarks

This morning occurs the second foot ball rally of the year, and it is up to every student and member of the faculty to attend and do all in their power to instill a confidence into the players for their battle with Colorado next Saturday. We are in the midst of a hard season now and the student body should not draw back a single step in lending to the team its united and enthusiastic support. Only in colleges where the game is well supported are strong teams found, and their strength is as a rule commensurate with the nature and the amount of backing given them by the student body.

Colorado has a heavy team and a good record, and the energetic co-operation of the student body with the men in the line will add to the completeness of the victory-for, while we do not like to boast, we can not anticipate any other result. The people of Lincoln have been liberal in supporting the team and have turned out in goodly numbers, but the students should not leave it entirely to them to push the interests of football here.

If the students will only come out and hear what will be said in chapel this morning and act on the impulses aroused, then there would be no reason for doubt as to the attendance at Saturday's game. Let every student bear in mind the fact that the team needs his support, and if each one does his duty and attends the meeting this morning he will be duly impressed by this fact. Let all come out. It will do us good to be together and learn of the opinions of those who are in a position to speak of the team's prospects; for looming up in the distance we see in retrospect a series of games that will call forth the best that is in our team, and which seem to increase in magnitude as we draw nigh to each in its order.

There are five games yet, any one of which is liable to surpass any as yet played and two of which are certain to do so. The interest stirred up at this meeting wil have a lasting effect and give impetus to similar movements in the future. Therefore come out-we mean everybody-and use your vocal powers in convincing the team that you are with them and be prepared to receive into your minds the just arguments that will be advanced, tending to show why our student body should do all in its power to promote the interests of our championship team.

Never before be- an event or promised so much entertainment as does this, and the very inception of the scheme shows cleverness and at the same time shrewd calculation. Some system of raising money for the college settlement had to be devised, and in order not to interfere with any of the plans that already exist and have been put into execution, it was necessary that something new and sensational be arranged, in order to attract the interest and gain the support of University people and the general public. The committee in charge of affairs are conducting matters in the right way and are pushing the enterprise vigorously, with every prospect of success.

The Library Fee.

The University treasurer reports that the sum of \$1,600 will be added this year to the library fund as a result of the one doffar charged to each student not paying some kind of a laboratory fee, as a library fee.

For some time there has been a strong feeling among many members of the faculty that some plan should be devised by means of which the departmental libraries could be made stronger. The great need was for duplicates of the volumes most in demand and for volumes to replace those too badly worn for further service. The fund at the disposal of the library authorities was not sufficient to meet the need. In several departments collections were taken in classes to make certain purchases. Finally at a meeting of the committee on fees the matter was taken up and Mr. Wyer was consulted as to the advisability of levying a small sum upon the students not paying laboratory fees. He considered it an excellent move, which would result in great good to the students themselves. The result of the trial has been most satisfactory.

Some years ago each of the departments decided upon the fees thought necessary to be charged in its own domain. The results were submitted to the faculty and their recommenda. tion sent to the board of regents which acted upon them. However, the growth of the university has been so rapid and the necessity for the formation of new departments and schools requiring laboratory work so pressing that a special committee was appointed by the regents to take charge of the fixing of fees for the entire institution.
