"DeWitt Hansen of Fairbury, Neb., well known in Lincoln, where he attended the University for five years, had a marvelous escape from death in the accident near Indianapolis last Saturday. His name is mentioned in the Chicago papers among those who came near losing their lives. Hansen is attending Purdue University and is studying telephony. He was on his way with hundreds of other students to attend the football game when the wreck occurred.

"Mr. Hansen is the son of G. W. Hansen, a leading banker and land owner, living at Fairbury. Particulars of the escape have not been received."
