DeWitt Hansen in Wreck.

D. Hansen, '03, was in the wreck near Indianapolis last Saturday, where so many Purdue students were killed and injured, the following article in yesterday evening's Star giving an account of his narrow escape:

"DeWitt Hansen of Fairbury, Neb. well known in Lincoln, where he attended the University for five years, had a marvelous escape from death in the accident near Indianapolis last Saturday. His name is mentioned in the Chicago papers among those who came near losing their lives. Hansen is attending Purdue University and is studying telephony. He was on his way with hundreds of other students to attend the football game when the wreck
