The present owners are A. H. Knutson. law '04; D. B. Gilbert, special student in the academic college; O. M. Rolfson, law '06, and G. E. Hendricks, '05. Mr. Knutson retires at the end of the year and some other student will take his place.

The Co-Op has gradually grown with the university. Originally occupying a room in the basement of the main hall, it now has a home of its own. All the books and supplies used in the evergrowing departments of the university are in stock as needed by the various classes and a great many new lines of stock have been developed.
