DR. ANDREWS SPEAKS.

Discusses "The Claims of the Church" at Y.M.C.A. Meeting.

One of the most successful of men's meetings given under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. was that held Sunday at the Oliver. Chancellor Andrews delivered an address on "The Claims of the Church," which was a powerful exposition of the subject and impressed the vast audience greatly. Among many other forcible points that Dr. Andrews brought out was that the church is a pipe line between modern and ancient civilization, it being the meeting point where their ideals are blended. The religion of one age through it has been transmitted into another. It has been the chief agency in educational development, not only in denominational institutions, but in secular ones as well. There are a great many agencies in the world to rend apart rather than to bind together. But the church is the great agency which is bringing us into a higher plane of social life.

Anyone in sympathy with the ideals that the church is striving to attain, should not remain outside of the church. The mere attendance at church, according to Dr. Andrews, does one good.

This meeting was one of the most successful meetings of the series, as well as one of the best attended. A large number of University organizations attended in a body, and all were well pleased with the high order of the entertainment provided. An excellent feature of the meeting was the music furnished by H. J. W. Seamark.
