Kansas Has Chosen Team.

Kansas has chosen her inter-state debate squad. A week ago last Monday the final preliminary was held at which six men were picked for the Nebraska division, six for the Missouri division and four for the Colorado division. The Nebraska division is composed of Bartlett, a member of the team Nebraska whipped last year; Leinback, a prominent debater; Kayser, Johnson, McNaughton and Benson.

A new system of preparing the teams has been instituted at Kansas this year, according to the "K. U. Weekly." The members of each division will debate before Professor Frazier twice a week until one week before the first debate, when the best eight will be chosen for the inter-state contests.

The leader of the team against Nebraska last year, Mr. Sims, is in the Colorado division.

Arrangements are being made for the Nebraska-Washington debate at St. Louis.

An Artistic Display.

Near it will be the reception room, which will be partly decorated with walled cases of the State Historical society, showing relics of the state. Most of these will be shelf cases, covered with plate glass and will show up this portion of Nebraska in an excellent manner.

Secretary Barritt of the Historical society is making all possible preparations for the selection and no doubt it will be an artistic display.

Palladian Debating Club Meets.

The Palladian Debating club had a lively meeting last Saturday evening, and one of the old time parliamentary "scraps" was the order of the evening, together with a heated debate on the emigration question. The interest shown in the workings of the society is marked and if the increase does not cease the advisability of a more spacious hall will be the prime subject for discussion. 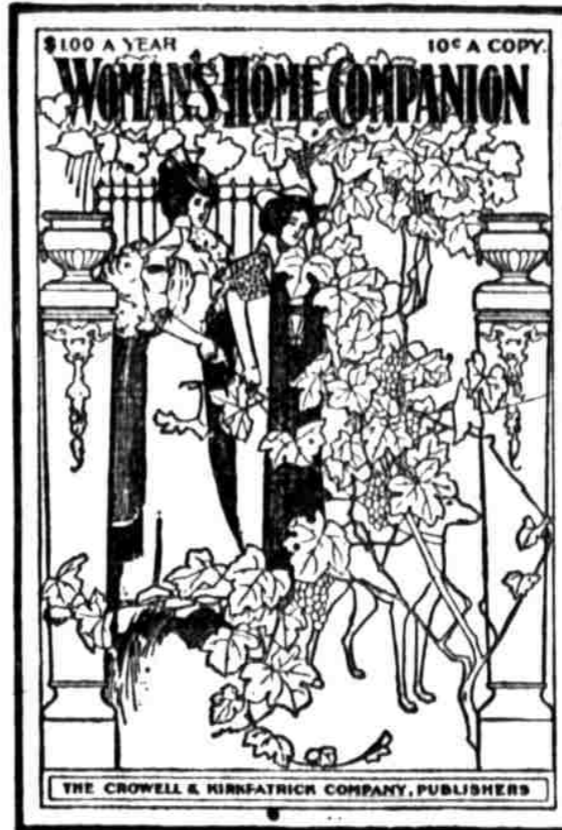
