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Editorial Remarks

The results of the efforts made toward ensuring a better and improved Junior Annual for next year are becoming apparent. The necessity and importance of such an end has been brought home with force to the minds of University people. Our attitude has been to do all in our power to call attention to the need of new methods in conducting the book and to further any just measures looking to such an end. And this is still our policy, and will continue to be such until a change promising better things is made.

As one of the phases that has developed in the agitation of this matter we recommend to our readers the declaration of the editors and managers of the book as appointed by the president, which appears on the first page of today's issue. The men whose signatures appear have bound themselves to a number of promises, which seem fair and which will certainly work an improvement if carried out. But it is for the class and the University public to judge of these and form their own conclusions.

The class should act for what it considers the best. The problem is rather perplexing, but it admits of a solution, and it is for the class to work out the result. Let it give this communication whatever consideration it merits and act accordingly. If it believes that the movement with which the circulation of the petition is identified will bring the best results, then it should proceed further according to the object at which it aims. Whatever sentiments we have expressed in regard to the necessity for reform in the manner of conducting the Sombbrero we still abide by, and any movement looking to a sure accomplishment of this result will be enthusiastically supported.

However it is always Nebraska's custom to feel cheerful until the contest has been fought out, welcoming victory and receiving defeat with equanimity. We hope to see our team make a good record, but realize the fact that it must meet some strong organizations. Basketball Men Leave On Trip. Games With Wesleyan.

This morning the basket ball team left on a trip which promises to be eventful whether successful or not. Two days will be spent in Sioux City, where the team will meet the city Y. M. C. A. and Morningside. The other two games of the week will be played in Minneapolis, one with the University of Minnesota and the other with the Agricultural School. The Minnesota team is one of the swiftest aggregations in the country, having returned from a hard eastern tour with a well nigh perfect record, after meeting some of the strongest teams in the country. We have met the Agricultural School before in a semi-football game and are well acquainted with them.
