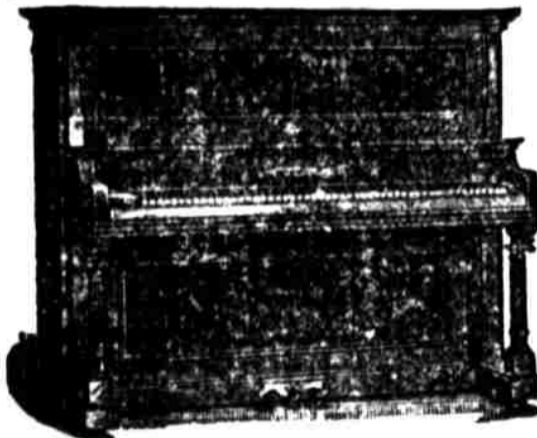

"We express our keenest sorrow and deepest sympathy to the members of the grief-stricken family in their bereavement of so kind a companion and father;

Dr. Sherman, who was to have delivered the first of the tributes to Dr. Edgren, was unable to be present and his address entitled "The Scholar," was read by Professor Fossler. The many excellent points in Dr. Edgren's character as a scholar were brought out. His educational achievements were reviewed and attention called to his high standing among the most prominent educators, as a linguist of few superiors and his deep knowledge of so many languages.

Dr. Bessey dwelt on Dr. Edgren's life as a teacher, laying much stress upon his great-heartedness and the close communion existing between him and his pupils. Perfect sympathy ever existed between him and those brought into contact with him, and his disposition was one of the kindest to be met with and truly characteristic of a great and humane man. His departure to his home in Sweden was regarded by all here as a personal loss, and his death was the cause of general sorrow.

C. H. Gere spoke of Dr. Edgren's life as an American citizen, detailing his war record and delineating upon the services he rendered his adopted country, and the recognition of such as evidenced by his rise to the rank of lieutenant. His subsequent career after he graduated from college in this country was largely identified with his work here, to which he gave the best of his life.

Professor Fossler spoke of Dr. Edgren as a man, as a man in the highest sense of the word. A perfect intimacy existed between him and Prof. Fossler, and no one is better fitted than the latter to discuss his character. He was a man that had the good of mankind at heart, and one whose labors have conferred a great benefit to others. He lived and died simply and unpretentiously, though a wise and Christian man.

Gen. Daggett at Chapel Today.

This morning General Daggett, who through a mistake failed to be present in time last week, will speak in chapel on the Relief of Peking. As one prominently participating in this famous campaign, no one is better qualified to speak on this subject, which is so full of interest to all. Tomorrow morning Dr. Fling will speak on the Japanese-Russian war, and this will be a discussion well worth hearing.

Elwood Mead, the noted engineering expert, who was to have spoken in chapel today and have addressed the Engineering society, has been unable to fulfill his engagement. Though we are disappointed at not being able to hear him now, we hope that the opportunity may be offered later on.
